A Voice from the Past

Many people have the idea that the great American President, statesman and thinker, Thomas Jefferson, was unfriendly to Great Britain. This view seems to have been arrived at because Thomas Jefferson took a strong stand before the War of Independence in resenting those British laws and regulations which adversely affected the American Colonists. Colonial resentments finally culminated in the War of Independence, and in the laying down of the famous Declaration of Principles as embodied in the American Declaration of Independence, of which Thomas Jefferson

was the author. Many persons are quite familiar with the oft reiterated and now famous advice of Thomas Jefferson to the American Nation, which begins:-"Our first and fundamental maxim

should be, never to entangle ourselves in the broils of Europe."

Few people, however, are familiar with the complete paragraph which immediately follows this opening phrase, and which indicates that in his heart of hearts Thomas Jefferson had quite a friendly feeling toward Great Britain, particularly as an ally in order to defend those liberties and nrinciples upon which both the British and American democratic systems of government were founded.
