Sift flour once, .neasure, add baking powder, salt, and cinnamon, and sift together three times. Cut in butter; add eggs, sugar, and lemon rid, and mix thoroughly, Add currants and nuts, mixing wet. Drop from tenspoon onto greased baking sheet and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 4 dozen nuggets.


