HOME PRESERVATION OF CANADIAN FRUITS

Canadian grown fruits will be on the market for several months. Strawberries and raspberries are about finished and now raspberries are at their best, which will be followed by plums, peaches and other fruits until the last late varieties of peaches and apples.

This year it is important that all perishable products be saved as much as possible as someone will need them next winter.

The aim in home preservation of fruit and vegetables is to prevent spoilage and preserve food value while retaining natural flavour, colour and shape. Canning, whether in glass jars or tin cans, meets these characteristics. The degree of perfection depends on the care taken in the process. From careful selection and cleansing to the last detail of storage only strict attention to every step will assure perfect result.

The home-maker may store Canadian fruit in a variety of forms ready for instant use in winter meals.

Fruits canned in thin syrup or made into thick syrupy preserves or jam are used in most homes. Jelly, clear and sparkling in its jewel tones, makes a useful picture on many shelves. But the home-maker is well to remember that "variety is the spice of life." Fruit juices may be canned for use as breakfast appetizers or cooling drinks. These juices may also be made into jelly as required by using commercial pectin or may be made into syrups and used in drinks or thickened with cornstarch for sauces. Fruit in its own juice with no sugar is excellent for breakfast for special diets, or for pies. Mixtures of fruits are good for salads or fruit cocktails. Fruits chopped coarsely and cooked in heavy syrup may be used as sauces on ice cream or puddings or added to home-made ice-cream, whips or gelatine desserts. Purees of berries, peaches, apricots or plums have many uses.

These products may be prepared by simple methods described in the publications "Canning Fruits and Vegetables" and "Jams, Jellies and Pickles" which are available free on request from the Publicity and Extension Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Pte. Jim McGeachie Writes From England

A local lady has kindly given us this letter from one of the boys in England, which gives a few glimpses into army life over there. Writing from "Somewhere in England" he says: "I received your cigarettes this week and I want to thank you very much. They certainly are appreciated very much and it helps us a lot to know that people back home are thinking about us."

I hear you have been having lots of rain. We have been having real nice weather and we have a lovely coat of tan. They have a great big outdoor swimming pool here, bigger than the one at Sunnyside. We go in swimming—quite a lot and are really enjoying ourselves. That is, as far as entertainment goes. The army life is the same old thing and we are getting fed up, what we need is action. I was down to see Tom and Bus Nichol last night and spent a few hours with them. We had quite a talkative few hours and we are supposed to meet on Friday and go out for a night. It sure was nice seeing them again and was like old times. We have been pretty unsettled here for the past six weeks, moving all over the country. We started out for France twice; the first time we got as far as Dover but returned after staying on the boat all day. The second time we were during the famous battle of Dunkirk. When we got home (?) we were thinking our lucky stars that we didn't go over. It was quite a fight and there very likely would have been a lot of casualties. The second time we really got into France. In fact, we got about 30 miles from Paris when we were ordered to turn back. We expected to be stopped by the Huns on the way and we were all ready for them. We had all the windows on the train broken and had our rifles sticking out ready for action, but I guess the only thing that saved us was the fact that they didn't know we were there. It was a great experience and what we saw of France was lovely, especially the wine and women. We managed to get a lot of wine but we were on the train all the time (2 days) so didn't get a chance to get acquainted with any of the girls—all we could do was wave to them. In two days we were in four different ports, two French and two English. We got a nice boat and train ride out of it.

Now we are back in England ready for whatever may happen and it's pretty hard to say what it will be. They kind of expect Hitler to drop parachute troops here, and believe me they'll sure get a hot reception. We are all ready to go to work on them, right now we can hardly get a chance to get a good night's sleep. Air raid warnings go nearly every night. It is a screechy siren and makes an awful noise. Last night it went twice, the first time about 12 o'clock and again about 4 a.m. We heard some explosions but don't know if it was bombs or our own shells at the planes. However, there was no damage done near us. It is pretty hard for "Jerry" to get close to us. I think we are comparatively safe.

We were in a beautiful town up in the Midlands and it was very nice. They had never had troops before and us "Canucks" went over big. There were all kinds of girls there and they really changed a lot of our opinions of England. They at least talked civilly to us which is more than the Alderhot girls did.

I have some more mail to catch up on, so I had better sign off for now. So cheerio.

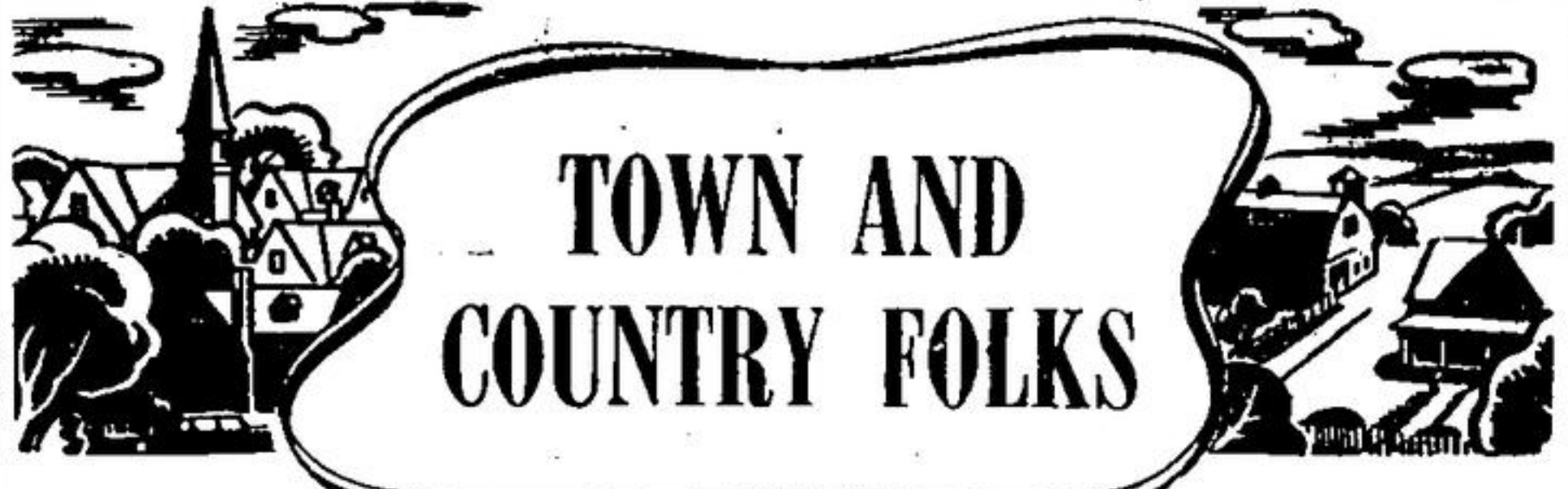
