



CHICKEN DINNERS

Nothing is more deilclous than a well cooked chicken, whether broiled, fried or roasted. Proper cooking is Capt. J. G. A moderate cooking temperature for broiling, frying and for roasting is the secret of tender, juicy chicken, beautifully browned. The flavours of bacon fat and but-

Broiled Chicken

Select broilers weighing 14 to 2 pounds. Split down the back, clean and sprinkle with salt. Pre-heat broiler rack for 10 minutes. Place broilers, skin side down, on greased broiler rack, about 3 inches from heat. Williams, 48th Highlanders, Toronto Brush with butter and broil 15 to 20 minutes. Turn. Brush skin side with butter and broil about 15 minutes longer, or until birds are nicely browned and tender.

Roast Chicken

Select A or B Milkfed chickens. Clean. Sprinkle inside of chicken with salt and fill loosely with well seasoned stuffing. Truss bird and place in uncovered roasting pan, breast side down. Roast in moderately slow oven, 325 degrees F., allowing 30 to 35 minutes per pound, dressed weight. A 5-pound chicken requires approximately 2% hours. Baste frequently during roasting with melted fat. Turn bird on ful. Why, he has travelled twice as back to brown uniformly during the last hour of roasting.

Note: Chickens may be satisfactorily roasted at 250 degrees P., allowing 20 to 25 minutes per pound, dressed weight, or approximately 1 3-4 hours for a 5-pound chicken. If rosating at this temperature, the birds should be basted more frequently. It is found
