EIGHTH YEAR FOR CHUHALDIN

To the strains of the 17th Century Dutch folk tune Dankgebet, by Adrianus Valerius, Alexander Chuhaldin and the CBC String Orchestra return to the Canadian airwaves Sunday, August 4, at 7:00 to 7:30 p.m. EDT. This will be Mr. Chuhaldin's eighth year as a conductor for the CBC, and there are few listeners in Canada or the United States who have not heard his famous strings from the Toronto studios. Since his debut in 1933, with Melodic Strings, he has presented his programmes to audiences of a coast-to-coast network in Canada, and to listeners of the three major American networks.

So many listeners have requested the name and composer of the CBC String Orchestra's theme music, that the conductor would like listeners to know that while the music is first credited to the Dutch composer, it is to be found in Seth Parker's hymn, "Song of the Traveller." A Piennese composer, Eduard Krüner, nearly two hundred years after Valerius, is named as composer in this publication.

Maestros Salute Toronto's Ruth Lowe

Diminutive Ruth Lowe has deserted the CBC Toronto studios for New York and Tin Pan Alley. According to reports, she is hard at work on a new composition, one that "I'll Never Smile Again" has had remarkable success, and is rapidly heading for new honours on "The Hit Parade", following Tommy Dorsey's recording. The story of the C.A.S.P. on his brief journey to and its miraculous return from France, and from England, he told Canadian listeners his impressions of the people of Britain as they prepared for threatened invasion.

No other reporter has been heard on the air as often as Gregory Clark. He tells his story with simplicity, frankness, and compelling charm, and his impressions of his most recent journey to France and England will provide the background for his talk in this series. PEEL CLERK PHILOSOPHIZES ON 70th BIRTHDAY

At a family gathering at the home of his son, Deputy-Reeve Henry Wilson, near Falgrave, David Wilson, clerk of Peel County since 1929, was honoured on the occasion of his 70th birthday last Sunday. Mr. Wilson has been in public life for a good many years. In 1916-17-18 and again in 1928 and 1929, he was reeve of Albion. He has also served on the Brampton Housing Commission and has been president of Peel Memorial Hospital Board.

Speaking of the "good old days," Mr. Wilson admitted that they had their drawbacks when compared with today. "Few people in rural or urban Peel would want to relinquish higher educational standards, good roads, and all the labor-saving devices—things people hadn't dreamed about half a century ago," he argued.

"One thing does worry me as I look around," he added. "If people don't keep a tighter grip on true spiritual values along with social values in cultural training, they may find out when it is too late that they have been seeking the shadow instead of the substance."

inflect an entire household. Yet, in spite of warnings by medical authorities, many people far too often accept the fly's existence and tolerate its presence as an inevitable nuisance during sunny days and warm weather.

Every year, unfortunately, we pay dearly for this indifference with outbreaks of infectious diseases for the simple reason that these germ carriers, born and matured in filth, eventually transmit this filth to drinks and food left uncovered. Summer dysentery and other infant maladies can often be traced to ordinary house flies.

A very effective, convenient and inexpensive method is to trap the flies with fly pads. Three or four of these, placed in strategic points throughout the house, will work quickly, cleanly and kill all the flies. This protection should start with the first sign of the fly season and continue throughout the summer months.

If every home and eating place adopted some precautionary measure much would be accomplished in banishing the menace to our health—and thus make the community a safer, cleaner place to live in.
