IF YOU MOVE OR WED MUST TELL OTTAWA

There are three items in the national registration regulations about which the public should be informed:
1. Persons attaining 16th birthday after Aug. 21.
Every person resident in Canada, man and woman, British subject or alien, who:
(a) attains his or her 16th birthday after the last day of the registration period, or
(b) was absent from Canada during the whole of the registration period, shall, within 30 days from the date of his or her 16th birthday in the case of persons mentioned in paragraph (a), or from the date of his or her entry or re-entry into Canada in the case of persons mentioned in paragraph (b), register in the manner prescribed in section ten of these regulations.

Upon the face of the certificate there is a warning to the registrant that he must always carry it upon his person. Before a duplicate can be issued the dominion statistician must be supplied with the name and number of the electoral district and number of the polling division in which the registrant ordinarily resided during the registration period. All registrants should, therefore, make a written record of their electoral district and the number thereof, also number of the polling division at their homes. Otherwise, the obtaining of a duplicate might be attended by embarrassing delay.
