

Upon the face of the certificate there is a warning to the registrant that he must always carry it upon his person. Before a duplicate can be issued the dominion statistician must ae supplied with the name and numer of the electoral district and number of the polling division in which the registrant ordinarily resided during the registration period. All registrants should, therefore, make a written record of their electoral district and the number thereof, also number of the polling division at their homes. Otherwise, the obtaining of a duplicate might be attended by embarrassing delay.
