He was buried in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval, on Sunday, August 26th. A large number of relatives and friends gathered to pay their respects to his memory.

**T. A. Spence Buried Last Friday**

An illness of three weeks duration proved fatal to Thomas Albert Spence, 74-year-old resident of Georgetown, who passed away at his home on Wednesday, August 21st. Born at Gilford, near Lake Simcoe, Mr. Spence had lived at Seymour, near Collingwood, coming to Georgetown fifty-five years ago. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Spence.

Mr. Spence was for years employed on the railway, as a stone-cutter, and then as section foreman. Retiring from railroad work, he became a market gardener until his retirement, when he moved to his late home on Main Street. He still kept up his farm, however—ten acres between the 8th and 7th Lines. He was unmarried, and lived alone in Georgetown.

Three brothers and two sisters survive: Charles Edward, of Braebridge; Lewis, Winnipeg; William, Georgetown; Mrs. Fred Wilson (Maggie), New York; and Lizzie, Rochester, N. Y. Another brother, Jack, died several years ago.

The funeral was held on Friday afternoon from McClure's Funeral Home on Maple Avenue. The service was conducted by Mr. Spence's pastor, Rev. W. G. O. Thompson, of St. George's Anglican Church. Harold George, Captain Johnson, and three nephews, Clarence, Gordon and Keith Spence acted as pallbearers. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
