
AIRMEN FROM DOWN UNDER SEND **GREETINGS HOME**







We'll fight, boys, fight, with British pluck and might, Give our foes the lesson they must learn, That with Britons they can't play or they will rue the


For we'll give them all the licking that they earn, England calls on me and you, our duty now to do,
