

WAR SAVINGS COMMITTEE LAYS PLANS FOR FUTURE

A meeting of the Georgetown War Savings Committee was held in the Legion Rooms last night. Chairman G. D. H. Cousins presided over the meeting, which took the form of a general discussion of plans for 1941. It was explained that the Dominion sales objective for 1941 had been placed at \$130,000,000, over twice the 1940 objective, and the co-operation of every citizen was needed to reach this mark.

Disappointment was voiced at the failure of the High School girls to enter the county sales campaign last September and October. Col. Cousins also stated that the employee payroll deduction plan had fallen off in Georgetown as it has across Canada.

J. D. Kelly gave a report of his talk to three women's organizations — the N.O.E., Local Council of Women, and the W.C.T.U. This completes his series of talks to local women's groups, with the exception of two organizations which have not indicated their willingness to have a member of the War Savings Committee address them.

A plan was inaugurated wherein any three members of the Committee may form a quorum for a meeting. The chairman may appoint a vice-chairman to carry on such a meeting in the event of his absence.

This coming Saturday a meeting of District Chairmen and Committee members for the counties of Haldon, Peel, Ontario and York is being held at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto. Col. Cousins and several members of the Committee will make the trip to Toronto to benefit from the discussions which will take place at that time.
