CY MACK

Cy Mack would rather be the villain in the movie than the hero in real life. He knows he would because he has been both—and he was more pleased about the cheque for his gangster part in a British film than he was about being recognized for saving the life of a careless young man who fell off a dock.

When Cy was six or seven and sitting up all nice and shiny in Salvation Army meetings (his father is a brigadier) and young Cy with a whole batch of brothers and sisters grew up in the "Army" he let his thoughts wander now and then to the things he would do when he sailed away from his home in Nova Scotia. The grand part of it is that he has done nearly everything he planned then and he would like to do most of it all over again. He went to Toronto first where he studied music for five years, had his radio debut as a pianist-vocalist. In 1935, Cy, Jack Curtis and Herb King became the three Canadian Bachelors, commenced a run in Britain's variety houses which lasted three years, took them from the provinces to the Palladium and included frequent excursions into the British film studios, the BBC and finally to a stellar spot on a commercial programme staged once a week in a London theatre and produced by John Macdonell. When Cy came back to Canada in 1938 he made several appearances on CBC programmes before joining the announce staff and one of the first producers he ran into was Macdonell who had preceded him to Canada by a few weeks, joined the CBC at Toronto.

Cy is nearly six feet tall, has inter-

esting streaks at the temples and side blue eyes. He won't have to worry any more than Mary Martin will when television comes—he'll be picked ahead of lots of other boys and girls. But he is aiming at the professional end of broadcasting and it won't have been a disadvantage that he has played piano, faced cameras, read lines, sung baritone, written verse, and taken several hurdles in his stride.

He likes roast lamb, Beethoven, collects old sweaters, loves golf hates gossip, still has a secret yen to be a sports writer. He would only leave radio for the movies; on winter nights off, when the golf clubs are stowed away, can usually be found in the orchestra seat of a picture theatre. If you are a friend of Cy's you are apt to get a present of a vocal arrangement (his own composition of course), instead of a cigar or an etching.

Christened Frank Cyril McKelney, Cy says he changed to "Cy Mack" when his sensitive ear had suffered enough under the punishment meted out to his fine old Irish name. He doesn't like to see anything suffer, his bank account would if he had one, for he would own a terrific wardrobe, and take it around the world on exciting travels by land, sea and air before settling in California to play gangster roles until he was an old man with a long grey beard. Then he would just play golf.

CANADIAN MINESWEEPER NAMED BURLINGTON

His Majesty's Canadian ship, "Burlington", which was named after the Town of Burlington, was launched at a Lake Ontario port last Saturday. The Burlington, known as a minesweeper, was added to the Royal Canadian Navy, and soon will be fitted for service on the Atlantic coast. Mrs. Alex Matthews, wife of the Lieut. Governor of Ontario, performed the traditional christening service with the usual flag wrapped bottle of champagne. Thrill whistles blew as workmen quickly knocked away the last block and stays, and the naval vessel, with the white foam of champagne dripping from her bow, slid slowly down the greased ways in a perfect broadside launching. Striking the water with a loud splash, the ship swayed from side to side for a moment or two and quickly gained her graceful balance. The vessel, equipped with gaily flying naval flags, was taken to her moorings by a tug which had been standing by and from which a whistle signal of three long and two short blasts welcomed the new ship to the Great Lakes.

It is quite an honour to have a boat representing the name of Burlington in the Royal Canadian navy, and her future record will no doubt be watched with interest by the citizens of the town. Dr. Craig has already expressed his view that the town should do something in the way of a small recognition of the naming of the ship "Burlington."
