#### CANADIAN MINESWEEPER NAMED BURLINGTON

His Majesty's Canadian ship, "Burlington" which was named after the Town of Burlington, was launched at a Leke Ontario port last Saturday. The Burlington, known as a corvette minesweeper and patrol ship, is the newest addition to the Royal Canadian navy, and soon will be fitted for service on the Atlantic ocean. tional christening service with the us-

ual flag wrapped bottle of champagne. Shrill whistles blew as workmen quickly knocked away the last block and stays, and the naval vessel, with the white foam of champagne dripping from her brow, slid slowly down the greased ways in a perfect broadside launching. Striking the water with a loud splash, the ship swayed from side to side for a moment or swo and quickly gained her graceful balance. The vessel, equipped with gaily flying naval flags, was taken to her moorings by a tug which had been standing by and from which a whistled signal of three long and two short blasts welcomed the new ship to the

Great Lakes. It is quite an honour to have a boat representing the name of Burlington in the Royal Canadian navy, and her future record will no doubt be watched with interest by the citizens of the town.
