The value of total exports of Canadian produce for the first nine months of 1940 amounted to 869.9 million dollars as compared with 696.3 million dollars for the corresponding period of 1939, a gain of over 25 per cent. Exports of agricultural products amounted to 285.6 million dollars compared with 218.4 million dollars in the corresponding nine months of 1939, a gain of approximately 31 per cent, says the latest issue of the Current Review of Agricultural Conditions in Canada. Exports of Canadian farm products in August and September, 1940, were above those of the corresponding months of 1939. While exports of grain, fruits, and vegetables in September, 1940, were 5.8 million dollars less than in September, 1939, this decline was more than made up by a gain of nearly seven million dollars in exports of animals and animal products.

Markets for Canadian farm products in the United Kingdom depend upon the policy laid down by the British Government and this policy is continually subject to change as military and political events affect the position of the United Kingdom. A wide variety and range of factors must be taken into consideration, including the availability of foreign exchange, the availability of shipping and the most effective use made of cargo space, the necessity of countering enemy propaganda and enemy activities in other countries, the maintenance of an adequate diet, the availability and use of storage facilities in the United Kingdom as well as in other parts of the world, weather conditions, the effects of enemy air action, and so on. On the basis of present information, it would seem that for those farm products on which no definite agreements have been made, little increase can be expected in export demand from the United Kingdom in the near future.
