J. W. FOSTER DIES
IN CHELTENHAM

The death of John Wesley Foster occurred last Friday, Dec. 20th, at his home, Cheltenham, following a paralytic stroke that he suffered about a week previously and from which he never regained consciousness. He had observed his fifty-first birthday two days previous to his passing. He was working at snow shovelling when aided with the stroke. Mr. Foster, born in Cheltenham, was a lifelong resident of the village. He was a son of Mrs. Foster, Brampton, and the late John Foster. In politics he was a Conservative and in religion a member of Cheltenham United Church. For four consecutive years Mr. Foster was a trustee of S. S. 4, Cheltenham. In his earlier years he was widely known throughout the district, conducting a threshing outfit and for the past twenty years he was engineer in steam shovelling operations. He is survived by his wife, who was Miss Louise Little, one daughter, Jennie; four sons, Eddie Hartley, Norman and Wallace, all at home; his mother, three brothers, George, Russell, and Fred, Cheltenham and four sisters, Mrs. Bert Harris, Cheltenham; Miss Edith Foster, Brampton; Mrs. Schreiber and Mrs. Buscels. The funeral on Sunday was largely attended and services in the home and at Cheltenham United Church were conducted by Rev. John Hurst. The many floral tributes marked the high esteem in which he was held. Interment was at Cheltenham cemetery.
