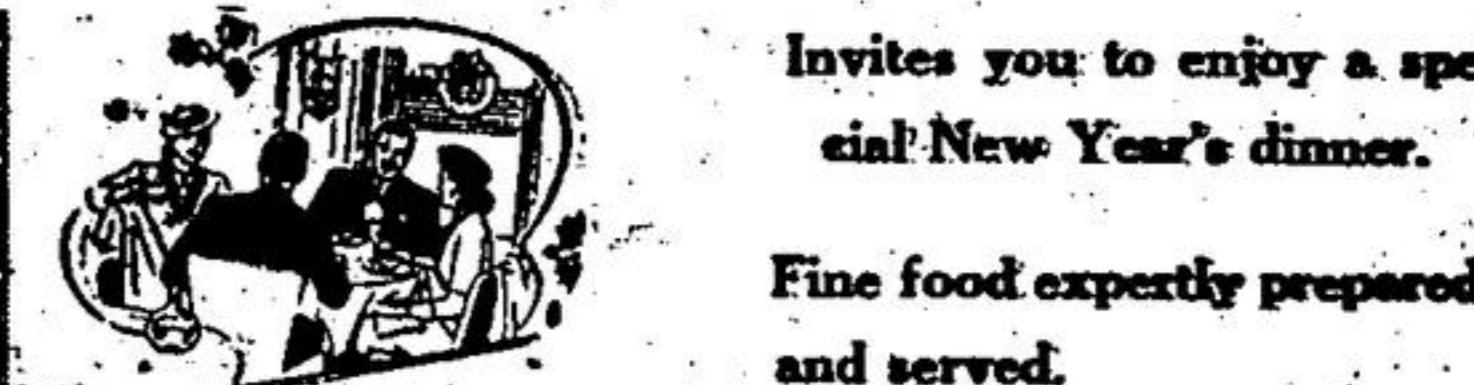
School has been closed for the Christmas vacation and Miss E. Shore has returned to her home in Woodbridge.
