STEPHEN DALE

Stephen Dale would be an ideal chap to have around at the finish of a lyncheon in Jamaica, the beginning of a complete party in Peking or right through the annual election meeting of the Ladies' Aid. He has a soothing manner, a legal turn of mind a nice sense of values, never gets unduly excited about anything and displays at all times an exemplary manner.

It was the passion of the minor virtues of an under-secretary of state, coupled with experience at the microphone, announcing everything from station breaks to the Royal Visit, that won Stephen his present diplomatic post in radio.

One of his jobs is to introduce important officials, Government ministers and other distinguished persons when they speak on CBC microphones to Canada's radio audience from the capital. Also when overseas reception is poor, it is Dale's delicate task to choose the proper moment to break in, apologize for the clamour of the elements and announce that the remainder of the period will be filled by a piano recital from the Ottawa studios.

In between times life at the capital permits the indulgence of some pleasant hobbies, the contemplation of the national scene, the development of finer philosophy and the confirmation of certain convictions. For instance, Dale believes very strongly in the social and educational forces of radio. It is his conviction that the vastity increased interest in public affairs in the past 15 years is largely due to radio.

Stephen commenced training for his radio career by talking at a much earlier age than even the most impatient parents expect a child to talk. He was born in Birmingham where his father was a professor and that may have had something to do with his amazing conversational gifts at the age of three, when he came to make his home in Canada. He started school in Montreal, where he became an ardent radio "ham," picking up the first transmission of the human voice in Canada. He graduated from University of Toronto with an M.A., earned his first money as a professional life-guard, spent it on a motorcycle and proceeded to practise death-defying stunts. Now and perhaps because of the motorcycle interlude, Stephen likes to just sit and contemplate the ceiling.
