POINTS TO REMEMBER

The referee is the official representative of the C.A.H.A. or the Branch of the C.A.H.A. in which the game is being played. He is in full control of players on and off the ice, goal umpires, timekeepers and the officials connected with the competing clubs, and will be backed to the limit in all leg-

itimate circumstances. The timekeeper's whistle or starts and stops play - not the referee's. But if there is any dispute it shall be decided by the referee, and his decision shall be final.

The referee had the power to overrule the decision of a goal umpire. All games 60 minutes (three 20-minute-periods); with 10 minutes overtime, except in an emergency when the President may order any game to be played to a finish. All games scored on the point system, two points for

a win and one point for a draw. Goal Awarded for Throwing Stick. Under the 1940 C.A.H.A. rules, the penalty for deliberately throwing a stick in the defensive sone by any player of the defending side, including goal-keeper, is an award of a goal to the attacking side.

Town of Bolton has Produced Some Exciting Hockey Moments

prise of last week for the following ors. interesting hockey story, which we are sure will be read by local sport enthusiasts with a great deal of pleasure:-Pew towns as small as Bolton boast such splendid and consistent hockey clubs over a period of thirty years. Apart from this claim history reveals some unusual happenings in the hockey whirl and none seem stranger to-day than the famous St. Francis game here on a Saturday night in the month of January, 1921. It seems side-boards for another stay in the the St. Francis club lost their way and kept the impatient spectators waiting until ten o'clock for the start of the game. The match was one of those old fashioned affairs, with everyone taking a whack at everyone else. Referee Steve Vair had more than work cut out for him and penalties were often. Bert Hedges, the crack high-diver, received a cut which took nine stitches to close. The game lagged on and the hour of midnight arrived and still eight minutes were left to play. Then the unexpected happened. With a perfectly good Waltham "turnip" in one mitt and a sturdy baton in the other, Bolton's Chief of Police, William Bell, stepped on the ice and officially declared the game over. "No Sunday hooliganism in Bolton" declared the officer. St Francis players and management raised a veritable storm of protest, even questioning the correctness of the officer's faithful Andy chronometer, to the time of which he had been faithfully and accurately blowing Plummer's whistle for two decades, with never a single protest legard to accuracy. No sir, all the hockey players in North America could not budge the Constable from his duty. And the contravention of the Lord's Day Act was the last straw. Here was an end to such things. The crowd left the Arena and quietly and decently went home to prepare for the morrow. Subsequently word from Bill Hewitt's hot-seat at the O.H.A. headquarters justified and backed the constable's ruling. The game was ordered replayed. Incidentally - and perhaps should have mentioned this earlier the home club was absorbing one of those 6-3 losses when the game was

halted. Some names which later became great in hockey appeared in that game. On St. Francis were the following, with the teams they were formerly identifled with in brackets: Koster (De La Salle), Lynch (Dons), Farlow (Argos), Hooley Smith (Granites), Grass (P.C. C.), Hucston (T.C.C.), Bert Hedges, Hill (Dons). On the Bolton team were Bill Phillips, Elywin Elliott, Forest Gould, Charlie Norton, Rod. McCutcheon, Lyn Gould, Walter McCutcheon, and Roger Pilson. From St. Prancis we still hear of Bert Hedges as a referee and official, Harold Farlow went to Russia to introduce hockey and we believe is back from the Soviet years ago, and they still can't play hockey, which is no deflection on Farlow. Little Hooley Smith was destined to become one of the game's greatest stars in the professional whirl and lastly we are informed Lynch became a priest and is still widely known through his connection with the great St. Michael's
