Bolton (?) Juniors made it eight straight last Thursday night when they invaded Burlington arena for their last scheduled game in the Junior "C" series. Burlington also played their last game of the year, finished with a perfect record on the other side of the sheet—eight straight losses, and bowed out of competition for the year. The game, which ended in a 6-3 win for Bolton, was one of the roughest of the year, with 23 penalties meted out by Referee Hugh McLean.

Georgetown Clinches Play-off Berth In Game with Preston

FAST, CLEAN HOCKEY WITH FEW PENALTIES—LAST-MINUTE PRESTON RALLY NETS 4 GOALS

It was heads-up hockey all the way at Georgetown Arena last Friday night, when the fast-clicking Georgetown squad edged the youthful Preston team 9-7, to practically clinch a spot in the Intermediate "B" play-offs in Group 2.

The Georgetown squad was on its toes from the opening whistle, and it wasn't long before they were scoring in the first frame. Well, we'll wager that the Preston goalies, Dewartz, never saw so many pucks flying at him from all directions, as he did in the first twenty minutes, when the game was played almost entirely in his corner of the rink. By brilliant playing, he stayed off the Georgetown thrusts one after another until with five Georgetown players milling around the net, Hagey broke away with the puck and scored an easy one, to give Preston the advantage of a one-goal lead.

Preston had the lead all night. Things opened up for the locals in the second, when Tik was banished to the penalty box for tripping Bakogeorge. Mooney and Murphy teamed up for a Georgetown marker, and Mooney repeated with another a minute later. As Tik skated back on the ice, Chara tied the game up on a pass from Hagey. The advantage was short-lived. Kemshead, who was playing his best game of the season, slammed Soloeki's assist past the Preston goalie, and Davidson banged another one in, just to make sure of a good lead for the closing period.

Just as well, too, because the Preston gang played an inspired game for those last twenty minutes, and the crowd was continually on its feet. Shortly after the whistle blew, Ward stretched Georgetown's lead to 3, and it looked like smooth sailing for the Papermakers. Then near-disaster came when Hoare flopped on a loose puck in front of his net, and got a bad clip from a Preston hockey stick. He skated from the ice but was soon back with his chin well-lashed. Still dazed from his injury, Seuder slipped an easy one past him, and it looked as if Preston was going to overcome the Georgetown lead, with five players inking pot shots at the injured Hoare. Kemshead hit away for another Georgetown goal, and Richardson and Lindsay added two more to give the local team a commanding 8-3 lead. With five minutes of play left, I. Debruske, and Mooney drew penalties for rough play, and the four remaining Preston players gave the crowd a lesson in last-minute rallying. In quick succession, Goad, Tik and Messner drilled hard shots past Hoare. Murphy stepped in to stem the Preston rally with another for the locals. Goad and Hagey teamed up for another Preston goal. With two minutes to go, the fans were treated to 120 seconds of hectic hockey, with Preston battling like demons to tie things up. Georgetown had no opportunity for the stalling which usually occurs in the dying minutes when one team has a two-goal lead, and no one could be sure of the outcome until the final whistle ended things.

It would be impossible to pick outstanding stars for Georgetown. The whole team played a bang-up game, and it would be unfair to single out any players for starring honours. For looked good: Goad, Chard and Hagey.

IT WAS a great shock to local sports fans to learn of the death of "Charlie" Ruddy at North Bay Hospital on Sunday. Charlie was a Georgetown boy, who had been living of late with his wife and family at Temagami. His death occurred as the result of a motor accident which took place near North Bay. To local sportsdom Charlie will be remembered best as a keen baseball enthusiast.

ONLY was he a third baseman and centre fielder in later years in the Georgetown roster, but in earlier years had acted as secretary of the Baseball Club. His untiring interest in baseball while living here kept the sport alive, and our mind goes back to the days when baseball flourished in this community, and not a little credit goes to Charlie Ruddy. His untimely death, at the age of 42, is regretted by a host of friends, and the sympathy of the sporting community goes out to the bereaved family at this time.

BETWEEN PROTESTS and rumors of protests, Georgetown Intermediate hockey club seem to be in a bit of a lull. Rumors of a Ferguson protest last week failed to materialise, but Milton blew the lid off when they served Secretary Norm Hill with a paper protesting Georgetown using a player by the name of McMillan under the name of Davidson. While the whole thing is so absurd it is hardly worth giving space to, it goes to show how far a club will go to try and down a winner. The player, whose name graces every reprinted report, is none other than Jimmy Davidson, and not McMillan as the Milton management would have us believe. However, the protest must be faced, and will come up before the next O.H.A. executive meeting in Toronto. As far as we can learn this is the only grounds for protest by the Milton club, and if this is the case they can kiss their \$25.00 deposit goodbye any time now.

What we did intend to impress upon our readers was that Georgetown, who had always tried to play a team of "home-brewed" and to look to Acton and Brampton for assistance this year due to so many of our own boys being on active service. However, we noticed the Pergus editor did not refute our accusations on the whole.

IT WOULD seem hardly possible now that the Intermediates could miss a play-off berth, although stranger things have happened. Their closest rivals seem to be Milton. This team has two games to play, while the local squad has two postponed games to get off their chests. Should Milton win their two and Georgetown drop both games, they will be out of the play-off. But this is hardly likely and we are looking forward to a good many more games here this winter.

NEXT WEEK will bring the Copper Cliff midwest hockey team to town and the play-off games for the Calder Cup. Ed. McWhorter's Lions are in fine trim and can hardly wait to take on Gordon Alcott's fast-speaking Northernites. The first game will be played on Friday night, Feb. 14th, a second game on Saturday and if a third is necessary it will be played on Monday. Let's all get on the bandwagon and give the boys a grand welcome, and may the better team win.
