The next one is usually the horned lark, more easily heard than seen, for he comes when the first bare patches of ground show through the melting snow. Armand Swackhamer reports hearing them last week on the southern hills back of their place.

To get to know and enjoy the winter residents there is nothing better than doing our best to feed them. Chunks of suet hung in the branches of trees and shrubs about the house will soon be found by many of them. The first to find ours this winter was a pair of blue-jays, and they were hardly away before two or three pairs of chickadees were on the job. Then a pair of the downy woodpeckers, and a pair of nuthatches. These are the pretty little acrobats that spend so much of their time standing on their heads. Just once, so far, has the hairy woodpecker put in an appearance. He is very similar to the downy but nearly twice

Then, too, we have had a half dozen juncos coming quite regularly. They do not pay any attention to the suct, but prefer feeding on the ground, and for them we scatter on top of the snow some small seeds saved from under the threshing machine at threshing time. This we had intended for the pheasants, but apparently there are so many so-called rabbit hunters in this town that the pheasants are afraid to show their heads outside of

the neighbouring swamps. This neighborhood has been favored for some years past in having as a winter resident, that beautiful and comparatively rare bird the Kentucky cardinal. It was only occasionally, we heard them when down on the farm. but when we arrived in town last March and all through the summer they delighted us with their song and brilliant color. So far we have not seen nor heard of one being seen in town this winter, and would be glad to hear from any one who has seen
