

# Georgetown Trounces Elora 7-4 in First Play-off Game

## Game Ended Abruptly When Elora Team Left the Ice

Lights Turned Out and God Save the King Played to Prevent Free-for-all — Return Game Here To-morrow Night.

Elora experienced their first "black-out" last night, when in order to quell a delicate situation which arose at the Arena, lights were turned off and the King played. Taking a severe beating at the hands of our highly rated Intermediate squad, the Rocks could not stand the pressure and with six minutes still left to play in the third period took their team from the ice. But let's start from the beginning.

In the beginning... the scheduled O.H.A. referee failed to make his appearance, due no doubt to the stormy weather. After holding up the game for more than half an hour, both clubs agreed to accept the services of Percy Blackburn, of Georgetown, to referee the game. Blakely, by the way, an official O.H.A. referee—listed in the O.H.A. list of referees.

The first period went along fine, until a few biased sport enthusiasts in the Elora village became dissatisfied with the decisions being made. In the meantime, the Elora goal judge failed to put on the red light when goals were scored, and he had to be replaced—or should we say switched from goal-judge to time-keeper. By the time the third period rolled along, both fans and players let their imaginary grievances run riot, and when Perkins was being penalized for rough tactics, this player lost his head completely. He exhausted his vocabulary of cuss words on the referee, who in turn increased his penalty to five minutes. This was not enough, however, for Perkins and he crashed Blackburn into the boards and drew for himself a match penalty. Meaning of course he would not play any more in that game.

This he continued to protest, even after the game had got nicely under way again, and involved the rest of his teammates who skated off the ice after Georgetown had scored their seventh goal of the game. The penalty-timekeeper also became unruly and tore up the referee's report which had to be later placed together. It was at this point that the spectators milled around the Georgetown players and the referee, threatening bodily harm, and only for the coolness of the local lads and the "blackout" a nasty situation might have arisen.

Elora plays the return game here on Thursday (to-morrow) night, with goals to count on the round, and it is hoped a better feeling may prevail and that the clubs will show a more friendly spirit. The Rocks have a good team, and the three-goal lead which the local club now have, may be none too large when those teams meet again. The winner will meet up with the Fergus Thistles in the finals.

But on with the game. Murphy opened the scoring early in the first period when he drove Lindsay's pass from close in. Elora then took the lead for a few moments when the Runnells Brothers, J. and H., on passes from Reid and Miller, added two more goals. However, Lindsay passed to Kemshead, then to Richardson, who tied the count, making it 3-all at the end of the first twenty minutes. This period was very fast, with Elora carrying most of the play into the Georgetown zone, forcing goalie Burrows to extend himself in order to keep the puck clear of his citadel.

Ward's pass for the first, and Murphy scored for the other. This was decidedly Georgetown's period, and had not the Elora goalie been decked with horseshoes, the score would have been much larger.

But the third and final period turned out to be the most unfortunate one. The Elora team, starting under the beating they were taking, resorted to rough tactics, and when called by the referee, were not willing to take it like real sportsmen, and thus ended after fourteen minutes of play what could have been a good game. In this period Richardson opened the scoring on a pass from Marzo, Mooney added another while Miller served a penalty. Hakogeorge went off for boarding and Reid scored for Elora. Two minutes later Reid flicked in another. Perkins then drew his match penalty and Georgetown scored their final goal with Davidson scoring on Murphy's pass. At this point Elora could stand the threat of Georgetown piling up a good margin no longer and decided to throw in the sponge.

Murphy played an outstanding game, with the other players equally turning in nice efforts. The Runnells Brothers and Elora's goalie were the home club's best.

## Faster, Bigger Copper Cliffs Take Two Straight From Midget Lions

Calder Cup Returns to Copper Cliff—Fists Swing in First Game—Georgetown Rally Almost Ties up Saturday Game.

Georgetown was treated to some exciting hockey last week-end when Gordon Alcott's Copper Cliff team, ably coached by Roddy Gogear, won a couple of exciting games on Friday and Saturday last. Third in the annual series for possession of the Calder Cup, emblem of the Ontario Midget Championship, Copper Cliff regained possession of the cup which they lost last year to the invading Georgetown team. The Midget Lions were a heavier and faster team than the locals, and though they had things pretty much their own way in both games, the Georgetowners were in there trying all the time.

Over two hundred spectators were on hand for the opening on Friday night, and they got their money's worth in excitement. Copper Cliff took full advantage of their superiority in speed and showed the result of better team-work right from the opening whistle. In quick succession, they piled up a four-goal lead, starting with a goal by Robert just after the whistle blew, which was followed by counters by McCarthy and Digby and another by Robert. Ormie Carter tallied for the locals before the end of the period, and Schenk got another early in the second to account for two of the three Georgetown goals.

The last half of the game more than made up for a penalty-less first half, and the referees had all they could do to handle the high-spirited groups. O'Reilly drew a penalty for Copper Cliff, followed by penalties to Coffey and Butler for fighting. Fists swung freely from this point on with practically every player, with the exception of the goal keepers grading the penalty box at one time or another.

Bob Johnston left the game with a cracked knuckle and Harold Schenk received a nasty cut on the face, while minor bumps and bruises were noticed among the other warriors. Between battles Copper Cliff annexed three more goals to give them a commanding 7-2 lead. After the last riot both teams were warned that the game would end unless they settled down to better hockey, and the subsequent minutes were a little calmer. Carter got the final score of the game to make it 7-3 for Copper Cliff.

Georgetown played a much better game on Saturday afternoon, when the two teams met again before a handful of spectators. Copper Cliff was without the services of Johnston, whose injured hand kept him on the sidelines. Digby and Robert gave Copper Cliff a two-goal lead to carry into the second period. Georgetown missed dozens of scoring opportunities in this first frame, finding it hard to do anything with the puck when they got into Copper Cliff territory.

In the second period, Walker scored and Georgetown put on a rally which worried the northern boys for awhile, but they came back strong with three goals to once more gain a commanding lead. Schenk scored on a wonderful shot from the blue line, and Digby came right back with a hard one from centre ice, making it 6-2 when the whistle blew.

Georgetown came into their own in the last period, and showed the brand of hockey which won them the cup last year. Carter made the best solo rush of the game, carrying the puck

through the whole Copper Cliff team to score, and adding another one for good measure. Harlow made it 6-5 with one and one-half minutes to go, and the Lions tried their best to tie things up, but couldn't seem to get the all-important tying goal. Early in the period McCarthy was knocked out when he collided head-on with a Georgetown player.

When the final whistle blew, old scores were forgotten and the two teams shook hands and cheered each other.
