

# Georgetown Team Enters Group Play-offs With Fergus

## Trounces Elora 8-3 Monday Night Fergus Here on Thursday

### Return Game at Fergus Monday—Kentner in Action Once More—Burrows in Net—Everyone Stars. Beautifully-Cleaned and Finished

Elora's protest over the first play-off game did little good when Georgetown journeyed into the Rock's territory for a replay on Monday night and trounced them again by an 8-3 score. It was the second game of the play-offs, and made a total score of 14-7 for Georgetown on the round. Georgetown and Fergus will meet to determine the Group 2 championship on Thursday night in Georgetown, with the second game slated for Monday night on Fergus ice.

Georgetown were minus two of their star players on Monday night, with Joe Murphy and Harold Mooney missing from the line-up. Jack Kentner, who hung up his skates early in the season to concentrate on coaching, brought them out of the mothballs, and proved that he hadn't forgotten any tricks by playing a bang-up game at defence. "Strat" Bakogeorge moved up to centre ice to take over Mooney's job on the Lindsay-Mooney-Davidson line, and came across with two goals in Georgetown's scoring spree.

"Shorty" Burrows was back in uniform, and a bad-looking right eye, framed with bandages, didn't appear to make any change in his puck-stopping ability. Georgetown took the lead in the first period with goals by Anthony and Davidson, and from this point their lead was never seriously threatened.

"Dud" Runnells tallied the first goal for the Rock's in the second period, and when Kentner drew a penalty it looked as if Elora might get back into the fight. Georgetown, however, kept pressing and with four men down the ice, Davidson scored on all beautiful triple play led by Kentner and Bakogeorge. Another Georgetown goal from Ward's stick was disallowed, as Kentner, who had skated in fast to pass to Ward, was in the net before the puck reached it. Miller added a goal for Elora near the close of the period.

The third period was fast and furious. Elora opened up and tried desperately to overcome a five-goal lead which Georgetown had on the series.

"Dud" Runnells drew a penalty for rough play, and a few seconds later, J. Runnells and Kentner drew five-minute penalties for tangling. Playing four men against three, Bakogeorge and Marzo banged in a couple of markers for Georgetown. Held scored for Elora, and Bakogeorge came back with his second goal of the night for Georgetown.

With Marzo in the penalty box, Kentner skated in all alone, to score again for Georgetown. A goal for Elora was not allowed on an offside, and Davidson ended the scoring to make it 8-3 for Georgetown.

## Burrows Hurt As Elora "Rocks" Beaten 6-4

### Georgetown Goalie Leaves Game With Bad Forehead Cut—"Get Perkins" Club Gives Elora Players a Bad Evening.

Shorty Burrows, Georgetown's brilliant little goal-tender was a casualty in last Thursday night's play-off fixture with Elora, when a flying puck gave him a bad gash on the forehead. With four minutes of the second period still to go, the plucky goalie was forced to leave the game. Before the game started, Burrows was wined when a practice shot from the stick of a Georgetown player caught him in the neck, so it seemed to be his unlucky night. This first injury didn't stop him from playing a brilliant game in the net for the first two periods, and he gets a good share of the credit for the two-goal lead which the locals carried to Elora on Monday night.

Young Abbie Kemhead got his second taste of big league competition when he replaced Burrows in the net for the rest of the game, and he deserves a great big hand for his efforts. This up-and-coming juvenile is a real prospect for future intermediate play.

Before the game started, it was learned that Elora had booked a successful Elora, and another game had been called for Monday night in the Rock's home town.

The game got under way in a fast start when Buggy Ward on the ice in the first minute, and passed to Kemhead who whizzed one into the Elora net. H. Walser evened things up on a pass from Reid, and Richardson skated in fast for a rebound on Marzo's shot to put Georgetown in the lead again. A minute later, Elora tallied, and Georgetown to make it 3-1 for Georgetown as the period ended.

Georgetown slackened in the second frame, and it was mostly due to Burrows' good work in the net that Elora was kept from piling up a lead. Lindsay tallied one for Georgetown, while Perkins slid one in for Elora. The bad man from Elora, who caused all the trouble in the earlier game, had been having a rough evening, with players and fans giving him quite a ride, but it must be admitted that he played a good game on Thursday and didn't display the pugnaciousness shown at Elora.

With four minutes to go, Burrows left the ice bleeding profusely from a forehead cut, and the referee ended the period, lacking the extra time to the final.

It was a fighting bunch of Paper-makers who waded into the last period, minus their star goalie, Abbie Kemhead, Juvenile goal-tender, was hastily dressed and did a sterling job of replacement in the Georgetown net. Davidson and Lindsay tallied two goals to give the locals a substantial lead, which was whittled down by two for Elora from the sticks of Miller and Walser.

The last twelve minutes were devoid of scoring, but the crowd was on its toes continuously, with Georgetown players taking literally hundreds of shots at the Elora goal. A word must be said for Walser who played a sparkling game in the net for the invading Rocks and his team-mates can thank him that the score for Georgetown didn't mount into two figures.
