**HEALTH**

Considerable interest in plans reported underway for a Plan for Hospital Care throughout Ontario was expressed to-day by officials of the Health League of Canada at its headquarters here. It was understood that the Plan would be under the auspices of the Ontario Hospital Association.

It was pointed out that a similar plan in its third successful year at Winnipeg, where more than 10 per cent of the inhabitants were enrolled as subscribers, and that all reports point to its having had a decided and beneficial influence on the health of the community.

"Any scheme," said a physician attached to the League, "which will make it possible for the low wage earner to avail himself of adequate hospital treatment, not as a recipient of 'charity' but as a matter of right for which he has paid, is to be welcomed. It is a scheme which is acceptable to himself, he can insure the same advantage for his wife and family, it may be looked upon as a distinct humanitarian advance."

According to details prepared by a committee of the Ontario plan would follow the plan approved by the American Hospital Association and now operating in many centres of the United States. It would be a non-profit, community effort based upon cooperative self help. Financial prosperity of the plan would mean, not dividends to stockholders, but increased benefits to subscribers.

The Plan calls for enrolment of employed workers in groups at the lowest possible monthly rate of subscription compatible with actuarial soundness. By arrangement with the employer this weekly or monthly fee to be deducted from wages.

In return the worker would be entitled to complete hospitalization for himself and any member of the family in case of need, and would have the assurance that the hospital bill would be paid by the plan without financial worry or burden to himself.
