Home Lake Military Hospital, St. John, N. E. February 27th, 1941.

Dear Mr. Editor:
It gives me great pleasure to write a note to you, and also to my many friends. I have not forgotten the pleasure of meeting you for the first time in your office when I was home on my furlough.

As I have had the misfortune of being in the hospital for the last five weeks on account of ill health, I would like to say a word regarding the great work that the Red Cross is doing all over the world.

For instance, the Red Cross comes once or twice a week to see us and brings us oranges, apples, gum, candies and magazines, and they have a little chat with us.

So at this time I am thinking of the Red Cross work you are doing in Georgetown and my home town, the Glen, and district.

There are quite a few sailors at this hospital, and it has been very interesting to listen to their experiences coming across the Atlantic which took them 30 days.

St. John is a very busy place as they have the second largest dry dock in the world, and there are many boats coming and going all the time.
