### Glimpses of Parliament

(Continued from Page 1)

The Government's policy on wheat was announced this week, but the discussion of wheat will doubtless be postponed until the entire farm problem can be discussed. It is estimated that as of July 31st, 1941, the Dominion government will own 575 million bushels of wheat at a cost of at least 400 million dollars and that it will cost at least another 50 million dollars to store this wheat for the following twelve months. It has therefore been decided to take steps to reduce the amount of wheat a sufficient production of wheat to prevent any increase in this large surplus. To effect this result it is estimated that the sowing of wheat must be reduced to 65 per cent. of what was sown last year. This will necessitate a reduction in the acreage of about nine million acres. In many parts of the West wheat is the main crop and it necessarily follows that these Western farmers must be paid a temporary payment to tide them over the transition period between the production of wheat and the production of other commodities. It is proposed to pay \$4.00 per acre to a farmer who summer-fallows his reduced wheat acreage or part of it; or \$2.00 per acre if he sows the reduced wheat acreage to coarse grains or \$2.00 per acre if he sows the reduced wheat acreage to grass or clover. From these figures it is a simple matter of arithmetic to demonstrate the fact that these payments cannot exceed \$3 million dollars, and would only amount to this amount if all of the 9 million acres is summer-fallowed. Much of it will be sown to coarse grains and to grasses, with a consequent reduction of \$2.00 per acre. This proposal is costly enough without being exaggerated, but I notice the Globe and Mail came out with a news story in part as follows:

"The new wheat policy, which will admittedly cost the country \$60,000,000 a year, raised angry protests among Ontario farmers today."

And followed with an editorial equally misleading.

The select committee of the House to examine War Expenditures met this week for organization purposes. Mr. J. T. Thomson, K.C., M.P., of Manitoba, was elected chairman. Mr. Thomson is a Rhodes Scholar and former Dean of the Law School in his Province. It was decided to divide the Committee up into several sub-committees as has been done in Great Britain. Each of these sub-committees will make a study of different branches of war expenditures. It has been suggested that such a study be made by Messrs. Leard and Havel and will be handled separately and that two other sub-committees will deal with Munitions and Supply and general war services. Public meetings will first be held to be followed by confidential sessions where confidential information might be disclosed, which would be useful to the enemy.
