square concrete base. At the base of the steel tower is a steel plate; below this a porcelain cup, superimposed upon a steel ball, all resting in a saucer-shaped top of the concrete base. This resembles a ball and socket joint. Therefore the entire weight of this tall tower is supported on this porcelain insulator about 15 inches high.

### Bob Goldham Signs With Toronto Maple Leafs

Georgetown sport fans took a great deal of pleasure out of the announcement that Bobby Goldham had signed for a Toronto Maple Leaf contract. Ever since Bob started in those Stratford-Georgetown midweek games, while only 14, back five years ago, local sportdom has been waiting for the chance to applaud when he would be taken on the strength of the Leafs. Many sports writers are now speculating as to whether Oomde Smythe will play him in the lead-line-up next winter or season him down in the minors—either at Providence or Hershey. Some think Smythe has a real find and will probably round him out as a Leaf regular next season.

At any rate he will train next fall at St. Catharines. A lot could be said about Bob and his hockey ability, but Georgetown friends know all his accomplishments. Bob Goldham is just turning 19, and is believed to be one of the youngest players to turn pro hockey. He is a student at Toronto Northern Vocational School and will graduate with his matriculation. Instrumental on standing Bob on his road to hockey fame, was Ryerson Douglas, at one time physical director of Northern Vocational School. Douglas was also credited with selecting Hank Gokup, the Kingston boy, for the Leafs. Bob will play lacrosse this summer to keep in shape for next winter.

conditioning units, offices, staff room, kitchen, toilet and garage. Heating is supplied by what is known as a split system. That is, the heat is supplied to the various rooms by means of radiators and also by ventilating ducts. The air supplied through the ducts is heated in the winter and cooled in summer. Heat to the air ducts is drawn off from the transmitter when in operation. This amounts to a saving of approximately 1,000 gallons of oil per year.

The interior of the building is as modern as tomorrow, with all fittings designed in a most practical and distinctive manner. The main control is a large oblong-shaped room with the various panels of the transmitter fitted flush along one wall. Some distance back from this is the control console, and behind that a wall of glass brick. To the left of the desk, at a higher level, are glass-enclosed offices overlooking the room.

The broadcast transmitter is a very involved network of electric circuits, with many miles of wire connecting its various units. These all focus at the control console and the operator on duty has full control of all parts of the apparatus and is continually advised regarding its operation.

And here is how a programme, originating in the CBC studios at Toronto, gets to the OBL transmitter at Hornby, Ontario, and then into the homes of the listeners. Music, comedy, drama, news, talks and special high frequency telephone lines from the studios to the transmitter building. At that point the programme is electrically amplified and broadcasted from the tower or antenna in the form of radio frequency energy to be picked up by radios on land, at sea and in the air, within a radius of several hundred miles.

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation now operates four transmitters of 50,000 watt transmitters similar to OBL. They are located at Hornby, Ontario; OBE at Vercheres, Que.; OBA at Seckville, N.B.; and OBC at Watrous, Saskatchewan.

It might also be mentioned that OBL was erected in 1937 and began operations on Christmas Day the same year.

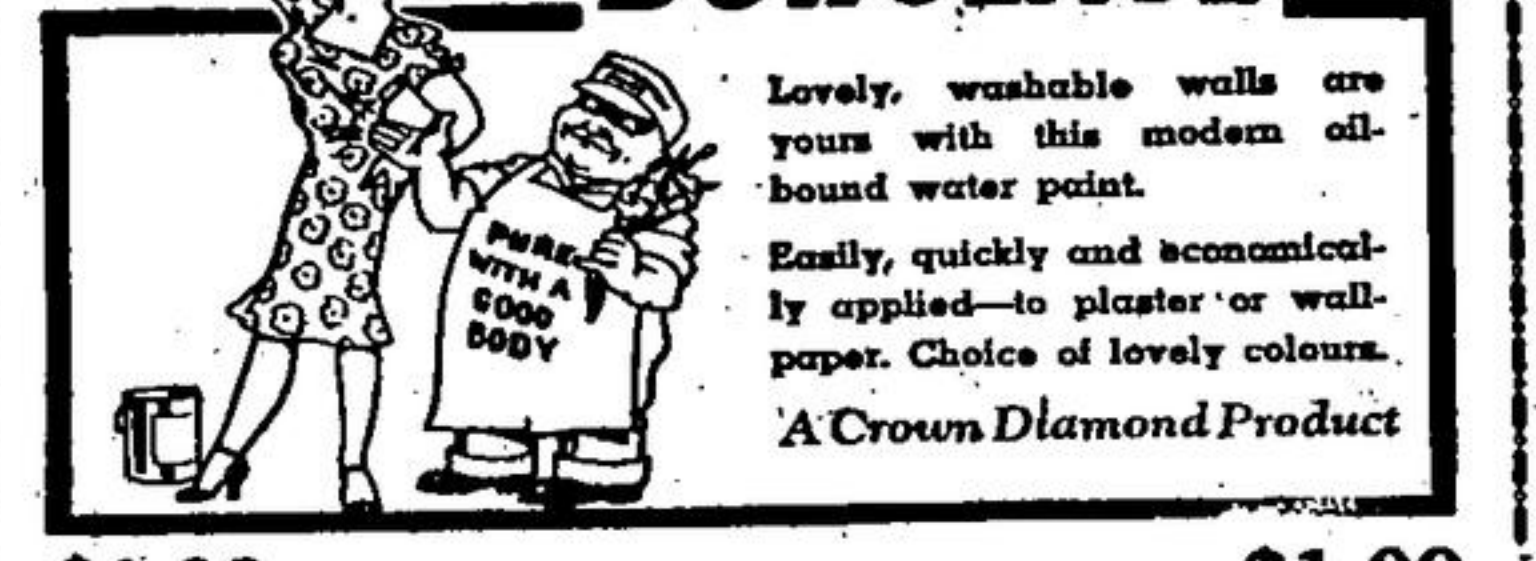
