Oakville, and June 12th, for Milton. Several local companies and organizations have already endorsed the plan and have promised to enter floats, and bands, and speakers are being lined up to make it a real show.  
Of interest to Georgetown people will be the gigantic Provincial parade, which will leave Toronto on Saturday morning, June 7th, proceeding to Malton at 11 a.m.; Brampton 11:30 a.m. and Port Credit, 12:15 a.m. It will be something worth seeing, and no doubt many townspeople will head towards National Park that day to see the parade.  
June 8th has been designated Victory Loan Sunday, and it is expected that ministers will have a special message for their congregations on that day.  
The Herald, in cooperation with merchants and local industrial concerns, is planning a special War Loan Issue for the drive, in which articles pertaining to the war loan will be featured and advertisements sponsored by industries will draw the attention of readers to the loan.  
Meanwhile, two subscriptions have already been made public—\$700, purchased by the Canadian Legion, Branch 120, and \$1000, by the Georgetown Cemetery Board. Bank managers have also signed up for substantial purchases, so Georgetown and district is well started towards its objective of \$100,000.  
In the last War Loan, one in every six persons in Canada was a subscriber, and if this average is to be maintained, two hundred and fifty people in Georgetown alone will be buying the new bonds.
