

Court of Revision, Regular Meeting Esquusing Township Council

Stewartstown, June 2, 1941.
A Court of Revision for the Township of Esquusing was held Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Wm. A. Wilson, C. H. May, G. W. Murray, Edwin Harrop and Geo. E. Cleave were present.

Benton, 243 dog tags at 25c, \$60.75, stamps and registered letters \$3.25, total \$64.00; H. Robertson, stamps \$3.00.—Carried.
Moved and seconded by Cleave and May, that the Treasurer pay the road sheets as presented by the Road Superintendent \$857.48.—Carried.
Moved and seconded by Murray and Cleave, that the Treasurer pay sheep claim, Austin Young, 5 lambs killed

\$45.00; Duncan Waidie, value \$2.00.—Carried.
Moved and seconded by Harrop and Murray, that the Treasurer pay the relief accounts as presented by the Relief Officer, \$46.50.—Carried.
Moved and seconded by May and Murray, that township labour be paid at the rate of 30c per hour.—Carried.
Moved and seconded by May and Cleave, that the salary of the Treasurer be \$400 per annum, to date from June 3rd, and the Clerk be instructed to prepare a by-law in accordance.—Carried.
Moved and seconded by Cleave and May, that this Council do now adjourn to meet on Monday, July 7th, at 7:30 p.m. Standard Time, or at the call of the Reeve.—Carried.

ANNUAL I.O.O.F. SESSIONS IN TORONTO

With 1,000 delegates from all parts of Ontario in attendance, several branches of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows will hold their annual sessions in Toronto during the week commencing June 16th.
The Grand Lodge of Ontario and the Patriarchs Militant Department will meet in the King Edward Hotel, and the Rebekah Assembly of Ontario will meet in the Prince George Hotel to review the progress made during the past year and to plan for the future and elect new officers.
A Rebekah Memorial Service, Reception and Dance, Exemplification of Degrees, and a series of luncheons, will precede the business sessions. On Wednesday evening there will be a banquet and dance for all delegates and their friends. Thursday evening

they will be entertained at the Tam O'Shanter Golf and Country Club, Agincourt.
The I.O.O.F. was instituted in the city of Baltimore, Maryland, on April 26th, 1819, and the Grand Lodge of Ontario was instituted at Brockville, on August 23rd, 1855. It will therefore hold its 87th session this year.
The Rebekah or ladies' branch of the Order was founded 88 years ago, and the Rebekah Assembly of Ontario was established in 1891. The Odd Fellows maintain Homes for orphan children and for aged and indigent members. Through an Educational Foundation Fund sons and daughters of members are financially assisted in securing higher education.
