Thursday night.
A letter was read from the Canadian National Exhibition directors, asking the Council to choose two representative children, 14 years old or under, from the town to be luncheon guests of the C.N.E. on Children's Day.

Councillor Costigan enquired about needed repair work on the 9th line road, and was told by Reeve Gleaves that he had been assured that the road would soon be repaired. The Reeve, who had just returned from a County Council meeting in Milton, also announced that the equalization problem had been dropped for this year.

Councillor MacDonald, as chairman of the Road Committee, submitted a list of suggested sidewalk repairs, amounting to \$336.04.

Councillor Mackenzie introduced the subject of replacing the present 2-payment tax collection with a new system of 4 yearly collections. The clerk was notified to prepare a by-law to this effect, and it will come up for discussion at the next meeting.

New Tax Payment System
It was decided to raise the rates for day labour on the streets from 30c to 35c an hour.
