THE WEATHER

The much needed rain came at last, and what a down pour! Nearly as much rain fell in the one hour it lasted as we got in the whole month of April, and considerably more than still it would need three more down falls just as heavy to bring the total rainfall this spring up to the normal of 9.06 inches.

Some fields of alfalfa have already been cut, much of which would be injured by this soaking, but it would give the second cut a good start, and greatly help grain crops.

With the rainfall 3.74 inches below normal prompt cultivation as soon as the ground is dry enough to work should be given garden and hoe crops to conserve what moisture has fallen.

On Monday evening, June 9th, at his late residence, Limehouse, Charles William Gale passed away after a lingering illness.
