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### Halton W. C. T. U. Meets In Convention at Milton

The forty-fifth annual convention of Halton County - Woman's Christian Temperance Union was held Thursday afternoon, June 19th, in the Sunday School room of St. Paul's United Church, Milton, under the presidency of Mrs. R. B. Galbraith.

Consistent with the present-day necessity for conservation of time, energy and money, it had been decided to hold only one session, and to condense the program to include essentials only.

Members and friends from Oakville, Georgetown and Acton met with those of Milton Union at 2 p.m. to join in a devotional period led by Mrs. W. E. Robertson, Milton.

The quiet impressive reading of the many "exceeding great and precious promises" from God's word revived the thought that prayer, as conceived of by the saints of old, is only "secret weapon" in our conflict with the power of evil, one which no enemy can destroy, but which we ourselves, through misuse or abuse, may render impotent.

The review of prayer which followed later in the program combined with the closing Quiet Hour (led by Mrs. J. McDuffie and Mrs. G. Harker, of Oakville) served to further strengthen the morale of the small unit of the Halton County army of temperance women banded together in defense of home and native land, against an "enemy within the gates" which, whether in peace or war, sabotages man's struggle upward toward soul freedom.

The review of the year's work presented in the reports from both county and local leaders showed a variety of activities carried on, chief among which must be placed the educational program amongst the children.

The report of Mrs. R. McDuffie (Milton) county superintendent of Essay and Poster Contest work (which is carried on annually in the schools throughout Canada), showed the work to be well worthwhile in stimulating interest in the study of scientific temperance by our boys and girls.

Mrs. W. G. Marshall (Georgetown) spoke of the value, also, of Medal Contests in education in developing temperance-mindedness both in school and home. Reporting a successful contest held recently in Georgetown, she strongly urged an extension of this work throughout the county.

The report in discussion by Mrs. J. E. Bell, Milton, reminded us also of our share in what is probably the most effective work by the Unions of our province, viz: that of providing the services of a full-time field secretary, Miss Rosamund Duff, whose lecture, "Alcohol, What It Is, and What It Does," is being given each year to thousands of students in many of the schools of the province, Public, High and Normal, as well as to church and people's societies and women's organizations.

Mrs. Galbraith (Milton) reported on the work of Temperance Education in Sunday Schools. In co-operation with the Ontario Religious Education Council, the churches, each year the W.C.T.U. conducts a national study course in scientific temperance through the Sunday Schools willing to co-operate. In some centers, this work is well done, though in many it is extended through co-operation of parents, and Sunday school workers. Some church schools are doing excellent work in temperance education through the use of posters and lantern slides obtained through the offices of the Ontario Temperance Federation in Toronto.
