**THE U.S. NAVY NOW**

If the United States should go to war or take any further non-belligerent steps in aid of Britain, she will find her navy on a virtual war footing. Since the collapse of France the United States has embarked on a tremendous naval expansion program, destined to give her a full fighting fleet on both her Atlantic and Pacific coasts. But none of the vessels authorized last year has as yet been laid down, and although most of the smaller ships should be commissioned by 1945, the "two-ocean navy" will not be in service until 1946 or 1947. A crisis at present would mean that the United States must fight with her present one-ocean fleet depending for its mobility on passage through the Panama Canal.

During the past ten years the American Fleet has remained in the Pacific almost continuously, with small detachments in Europe, Asia, and the Caribbean. With the outbreak of war in Europe, naval vessels on the other side of the Atlantic were replaced by coast-guard cutters and some of the old World War destroyers and submarines were brought out to assist in the control of the Pan-American neutrality zone. Last spring the main body of the fleet was sent to Pearl Harbour, Hawaii, where it has been based ever since. The Navy Department then sought to strengthen its small nucleus of ships in the Atlantic, and five days after Japan joined the Axis last October it was announced that a newly organized patrol force with its own command was to be established in the Atlantic. In February of 1941 this force was raised to the status of

a separate fleet, and the Navy resumed the three fleet organization abandoned in 1922.

At the moment the disposition of the fleet is approximately as follows: (exact figures are of course not available.)

1. The Pacific Fleet, based in Hawaii, includes the major striking power of the Navy, with 12 of its most modern battleships to match the 10 capital ships of Japan; as well as four aircraft carriers, which are considered more than a match for the Japanese lighter but more numerous carriers; the bulk of the light and heavy cruisers; many destroyers and submarines and four wings of patrol planes, each consisting of 3 to 5 squadrons of 12 planes.

2. The Atlantic Fleet, probably totaling 125 vessels. It is built around the three oldest battleships and the half demilitarized training ship Wyoming. It includes several new cruisers, 2 aircraft carriers, destroyers, submarines, patrol planes. Like the Pacific fleet this group is provided with a full train of auxiliary and supply ships. Pending the completion of the new actions on the British Islands and the new fleet anchorage being prepared in Puerto Rico, the Atlantic Fleet is based on the three great mainland bases of Boston, New York and Norfolk, Virginia, as well as the Caribbean outposts as far south as the Panama Canal zone. The Atlantic fleet which is due for a great expansion from the newly constructed vessels, is strong enough to deal with raiders. To it goes the job of carrying out the naval patrol established well out into the Atlantic, and to it would presumably be given the job of conveying if such a step were decided upon. In both those activities great assistance would be given by the long range patrol bombers of which there are at present about 300 in service on all fronts.

3. The Asiatic Fleet, includes about 35 cruisers, destroyers, and submarines, as well as a minor force of patrol planes which has, however, been recently reinforced. It is based on Manila in the Philippines, a strong harbour which has, however, no facilities for repairing capital ships. Neither the British, Dutch, or Americans maintain any battle ships in the Far East.
