Sanford, relief account to June 30th \$25.00, supplies 48c, total \$25.48; The Georgetown Herald, account, \$13.74; Board of Hydro Commissioners, Georgetown, street lights at Glen Williams to June 30th, \$74.75; Acton Public Utilities Commission, Crescent Street lights to June 17th, \$15.00; County of Halton, interest on rates paid January 15th, \$20.55; Clerk, stamps \$2.49; H. Robertson, stamps \$6.00; H.E.P.C. of Ontario, Brampton, lights at council chamber \$4.08.—Carried.

Stevenson, treatment to No. 10 March 22 to June 15th, \$26.00; Department of Health of Ontario, insulin supplied to 3 indigents Jan. 1 to Mar. 31st, \$2.84; J. Sanford, account to June 30th, \$24.85.—Carried.

Moved and seconded by May and Cleave, that the grants to Esqueuing and Acton Agricultural Societies be \$75.00 each, and to Halton Agricultural Society \$25.00.—Carried.

Moved and seconded by Harrop and Murray, that the Treasurer pay: G. C. Brown, renewal Bond No. 43 \$2.00 for Clerk, to July 15th, 1942, \$5.00; Cecil Chisholm, assessor, 11 dog tags at 25c each, \$2.75.—Carried.

Moved and seconded by May and Cleave that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to amend by-law No. 927, regarding the salary of the Treasurer of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Esqueuing, and that said by-law be now read a first time.—Carried.

Moved and seconded by Murray and Harrop, that by-law No. 941 regarding the salary of the Treasurer of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Esqueuing, having been read a first time, be now read a second and third times and passed, and the seal of the Corporation be attached thereto.—Carried.

Moved and seconded by Murray and Harrop, that this Council do now adjourn to meet on Monday, August 4th, at 7.30 p.m. standard time, or at the call of the Reeve.—Carried.

There is URGENT NEED for stout-hearted able-bodied men to volunteer for ACTIVE SERVICE in the CANADIAN ARMY.

Wherefore Canada sends out a

### CALL TO ARMS

And charges all true Canadians to heed and to help.

Given at National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa, this First day of July in the Year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, and in the seventy-fifth year of Confederation.

## BY-LAW NO. 416

### Town Of Georgetown

A BY-LAW authorizing the taking of the assessment in the Town of Georgetown between the 1st day of April and the 30th day of September in the year preceding the year in which the taxes are fixed and levied upon such assessment.

WHEREAS by Section 59 (1) of the Assessment Act, being R.S.O. 1937, Chapter 272, the council of any town may pass a by-law authorizing the taking of the assessment in the said town between the 1st day of April and the 30th day of September in the year preceding the year in which the taxes are fixed and levied upon such assessment.

AND WHEREAS by Section 59 (3) of the said Act, the council instead of making a second assessment in the transition year may adopt the assessment roll previously made and revised in such transition year.

THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN BY ITS COUNCIL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. Subject to the provisions of Clause 4, the assessor for the Town of Georgetown shall hereafter between the 1st day of April and the 30th day of September in each year take the assessment upon which the taxes in the next following year for the Town of Georgetown shall be fixed and levied to the intent that after the 31st day of December, 1941, the taxes fixed and levied in every year in the Town of Georgetown shall be fixed and levied on an assessment taken between the 1st day of April and the 30th day of September in the year next preceding the year in which the taxes are fixed and levied.

2. The assessor for the Town of Georgetown shall hereafter on or before the 1st day of October in each year deliver in the form and with the forms required by Statute to the Clerk of the Town of Georgetown, the completed assessment roll upon which the taxes for the next following year in the Town of Georgetown shall be fixed and levied.

3. The date for closing the Court of Revision in each year in the Town of Georgetown shall hereafter be the 15th day of November next following the return of the assessment roll and the date for the final return by the Judge of the County Court in each year shall hereafter be the 15th day of December next following the return of the assessment roll.

4. The assessment roll previously made and revised in the year 1941 is hereby adopted as the assessment roll upon which shall be fixed and levied the taxes for the year 1942 and the time for closing the Court of Revision in connection with the appeals from such assessment roll shall be the 15th day of November, 1941, and the final return of the Judge of the County Court in connection therewith shall be the 15th day of December, 1941.

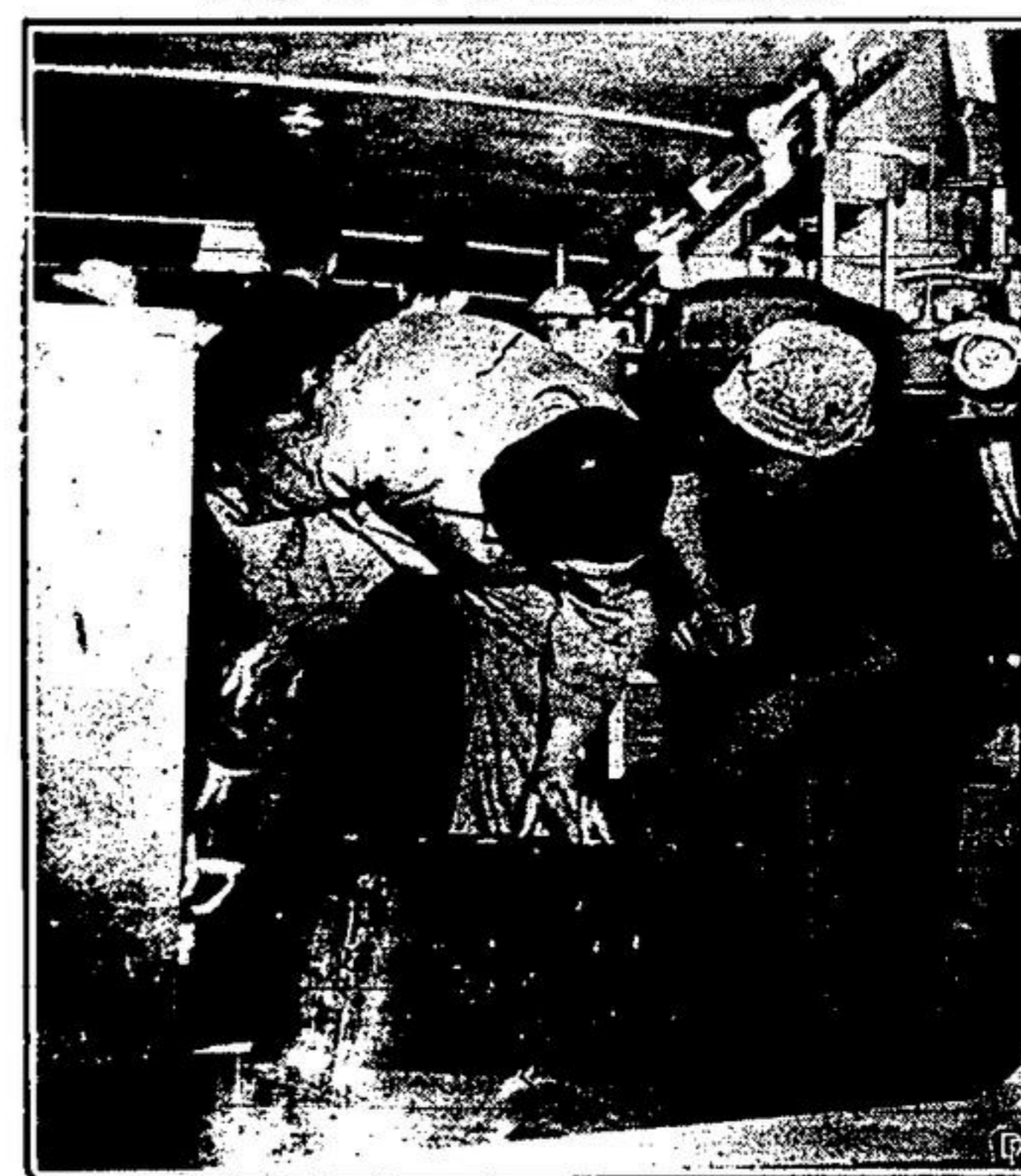
5. All by-laws or parts of by-laws not in accordance herewith are hereby repealed.
