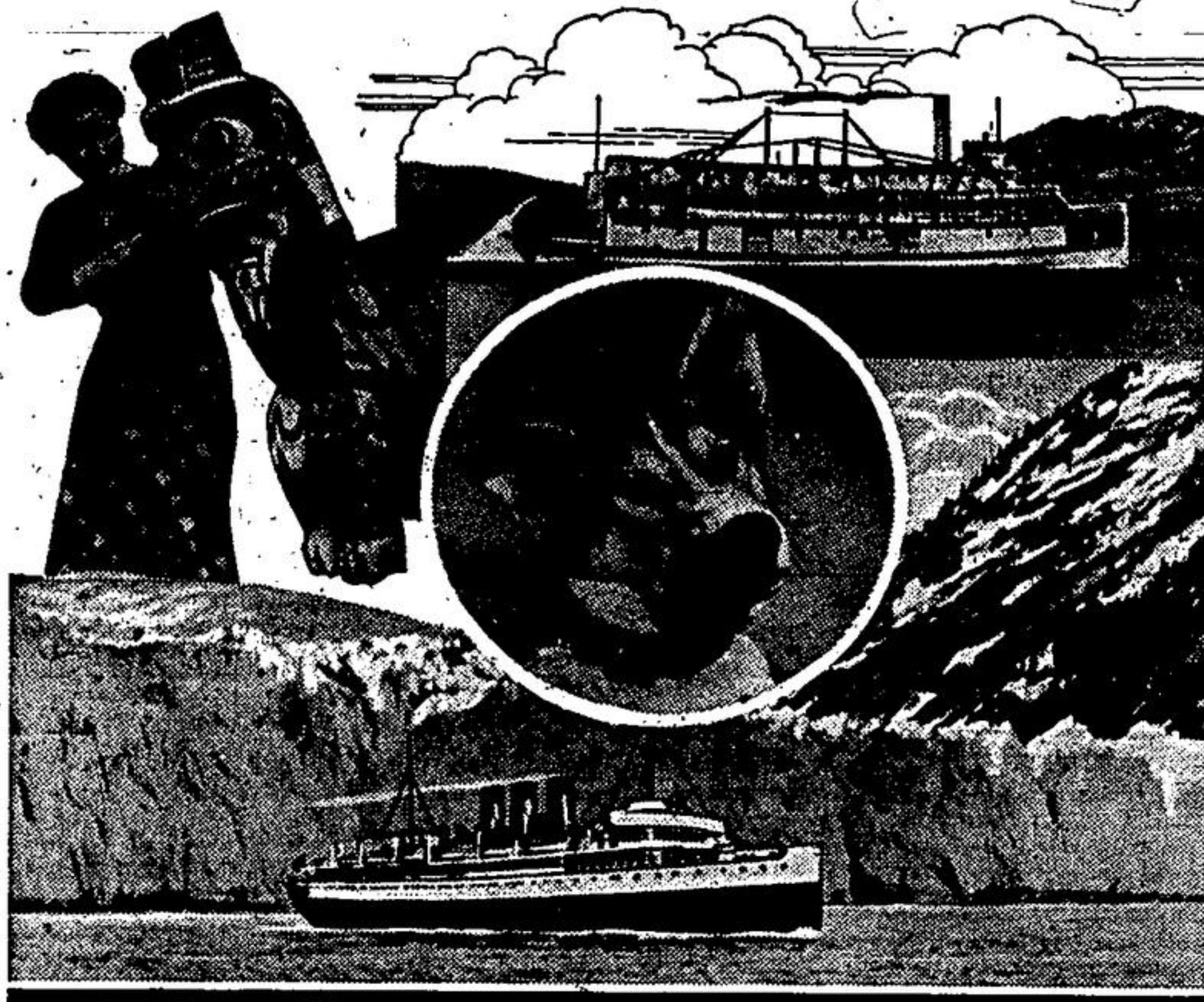
—In the list of Public School promotions, published last week in the Herald, the name of Robert Mathews was omitted. He was promoted from Grade VI to Grade VII.

Alaska Cruise Delightful Holiday



The Trail of '98 that once taxed the energies of Alaska-bound prospectors, today has an alternative and more attractive route, served not by dog-sled, but by luxury steamships of the Canadian Pacific coast fleet, and following the sheltered "Inside Passage" between Vancouver and Skagway. These trim liners, whose sister ships ply the "Tri-anglo Route" between Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle, and cruise the west coast of Vancouver Island, bring the "Midnight Sun" within three days of Vancouver.

Commencing May 2 and effective till Sept. 30, three smart "Princess" liners will conduct a series of 9-day cruises from Vancouver to Skagway, with a 33-hour stop-over at the Alaskan port. The B.C. coast service will also operate three 11-day cruises to Alaska, allowing for side trips by rail and lake from Skagway to Lake Bennett, Whitehorse and West Taku Arm. The cruise liner "Princess Charlotte" will feature in these tours.

From county deck chairs, today's northbound nomad is treated to a moving pageant of majestic glaciers, towering peaks, and rock-bound fjords. Adventure waits at every port of call. Alert Bay, Prince Rupert, Ketchikan, Wrangell and Juneau follow in colorful succession, each with its weird array of totem poles and other symbols of Indian life. Picturesque "Sunset Cruises" along the west coast of Vancouver Island are also scheduled for the current season between Victoria and Port Alice. These popular cruises offer the passenger eight days of splendid coastal scenery with regular stop-overs at quaint Indian "fishing villages." Two Canadian Pacific liners will be in "Sunset Cruise" service from June 1 to September 21.

Takes Drastic Action

was passed at \$12.90 for the month, it showed signs that in the very near future the town would be free of traffic recipients. In this connection it was deemed advisable to discontinue the services of the Relief Officer, Mr. F. Kersey, as at July 31st.

The request of the Navy League to hold a tax day in town on August 2nd was granted, and this will be held in charge of the I.O.D.E.

Mayor Gibbons was instructed to issue a proclamation proclaiming Monday, August 4th, a Civic Holiday in Georgetown.

On the proposal of Councillor S. J. Mackenzie, at a recent meeting of council, a by-law was put into effect changing the method of the town assessment, which will require the collecting of taxes four times yearly, instead of the twice yearly system now in effect. The new by-law bases the 1942 assessment on the 1941 figures, with the new collection system going into effect next year.

Reeve Cleave reported on the court held at Milton to equalize the assessment of Nassagaweya Township, when it was agreed that Burlington take \$50,000 of the proposed revision in the \$150,000 assessment, Nassagaweya \$75,000, and the remaining \$25,000 divided amongst the other municipalities—Oakville, Milton, Acton, Georgetown, Nelson, Trafalgar and Essex.

Mayor Gibbons at this point complimented Reeve Harold Cleave on the way in which he represented the town at the court of appeal in Milton. "The town was well represented by Reeve Cleave," said the Mayor, who had himself attended the session as a spectator only.

If there is one town by-law which gets more publicity than another at council meetings, it's the parking by-law. It crops up at almost every meeting and brings forth plenty of heated discussion. Monday's debate opened when Councillor Mackenzie asked if the night constables had been instructed to direct traffic on "open nights." To which the Mayor very decidedly said he had given him definite instructions to see that the parking by-law was carried out to the letter.

Councillor Brown opposed the Mayor's attitude of keeping cars on the move on Main Street and not allowing double parking. He felt it bad for business.

He had the support of Reeve Cleave, while Councillor Mackenzie who had started the argument did not oppose or agree with the Mayor, but was content to remain astride the fence. Councillor Costigan would back Mayor Gibbons if he would enforce the by-law to the point where the buses would be required to keep moving on Main Street or re-route them from the Main Street as in some other towns.

Mayor Gibbons: "I am behind you one hundred percent if you want to change the by-law."

Mackenzie: "We have a lot of vacant space in front of our place, maybe we could get the bus agency." "I suggest they step up over the bridge."

Mayor Gibbons: "I intend to have the parking by-law enforced to the letter, and if our constables won't do it someone else will. If council want to change the parking and traffic regulations in any other way, they would have to change the by-law. But as long as it remains as it is, I intend to see that it is enforced."
