

WILFRID CROWE WAR PRISONER

Thursday, July 10th, Mr. Russell Morrow, Orangeville jeweler, received a cablegram from his sister-in-law, Mrs. Wilfrid Crowe, who has been in England since early in the war, informing him that she had been advised that her husband, Capt. W. R. Crowe, M.D., had been made a prisoner of war. The cablegram contained no information as to the whereabouts of the captured officer. Mr. Morrow sent Mrs. Crowe a cable asking for further information, but up to yesterday morning had not received any reply.

Capt. Crowe, who is a son of Mrs. F. J. Crowe and a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Shaw, was practising his profession and operating a drug business in Minden, Ontario, at the commencement of the war. He disposed of his practice and business with as little delay as possible and he and Mrs. Crowe both volunteered and went accepted for overseas service. They sailed from Canada late in the autumn of 1939 and arrived in England on Christmas Day. Mrs. Crowe has been in England since then.

When last heard from Dr. Crowe was serving with the Middle East forces in Egypt and it is believed that he was made prisoner either in North Africa or Syria. If he was captured by German or Italian forces in North Africa he will probably remain a prisoner for the duration of the war. It is of course quite possible that he was serving in Syria and was captured by Vichy French troops. In that case he would be released under the terms of the lately concluded armistice.

Captain Crowe was born in Amaranth township, a short distance from Laurel, in 1894. The family moved to Saskatchewan in 1906, but returned to Orangeville twelve years later. During the first war, Wilfrid
