A DAY AT THE EX

Last Friday, the directors of the Canadian National Exhibition once more played host to a number of newspapermen at the annual Press Day.

For us, the day is like another weekly newspaper convention, where we can meet and chat with fellow editors from all over the province, and we thoroughly enjoyed ourselves. The luncheon in the Administration Building brought back thoughts of last year when James Cromwell, ex-United States Minister to Canada, delivered a stirring address, pointing out how his country was gradually realizing that they had a part to play in the war. How far they have gone in this realization can be gathered from President Roosevelt's speech on Labour Day when he called his country to turn out more and more war products to be sent to those countries fighting aggression and totalitarianism.

This year, the guest speaker was Mr. W. Rupert Davies, publisher of the Kingston Whig-Standard, who gave some interesting glimpses of Canada's war effort, gleaned in a recent trip he took with a number of newspapermen around various munitions plants and training schools in the province. He spoke most highly of the officers' training school at Brockville, where our local high school principal, J. L. Lambert, is at present taking a three-month training course.

OUTSTANDING

We hope that no one missed the Ford exhibit at the Ex. this year, and those of you who have taken your trip and failed to see it, would be well advised to go back again just for this one feature. It is located in a large field south of the grand-stand, where fighting machines are put thru their paces by test drivers over rough terrain simulating a modern battle-ground.

One of these machines—the artillery tractor—is a real triumph of modern industrial skill. To show its versatility, it was driven into a pit, about six or seven feet deep, bottomed with mud and water, and appeared to be hopelessly mired. But no — a power-operated cable, called a winch, was pulled out from under the machine, attached to a solid object in the ground, and the tractor pulled itself out of the hole by its own power.

After the test drivers had performed seemingly impossible feats with the Ford machines, a detachment of troops from the Perth Regiment, stationed at Camp Borden, demonstrated the uses to which the machines are put in battle.

It would take this whole newspaper to describe all the wonderful things to be seen this year at the Ex. Practically the whole show is patterned along military lines, from Elsie the Cow, who is doing her bit for British war victims, to the grand-stand performance, which is climaxed by a mock battle staged by troops from the active army.

There's still time for those of you who haven't made the trip to Toronto to get down and "See Canada's Answer."
