There is an old saying that we may expect all kinds of weather on a fall day. The past week has certainly given us considerable variety. The most touching being the first killing frost on the night of the 17th, just one day later than that of last year. This is something that every flower loving gardener regrets for it puts an end to the summer glory of the garden.

On the 14th we had the heaviest rainfall (1.23 inches) since that of June 14th. This helped to soften the ground for fall plowing, baked hard after a summer of drought.

The average daily temperature for the week was 47 degrees, another drop of 4 degrees lower than the previous week. A daily fire in the furnace has now become a necessity.
