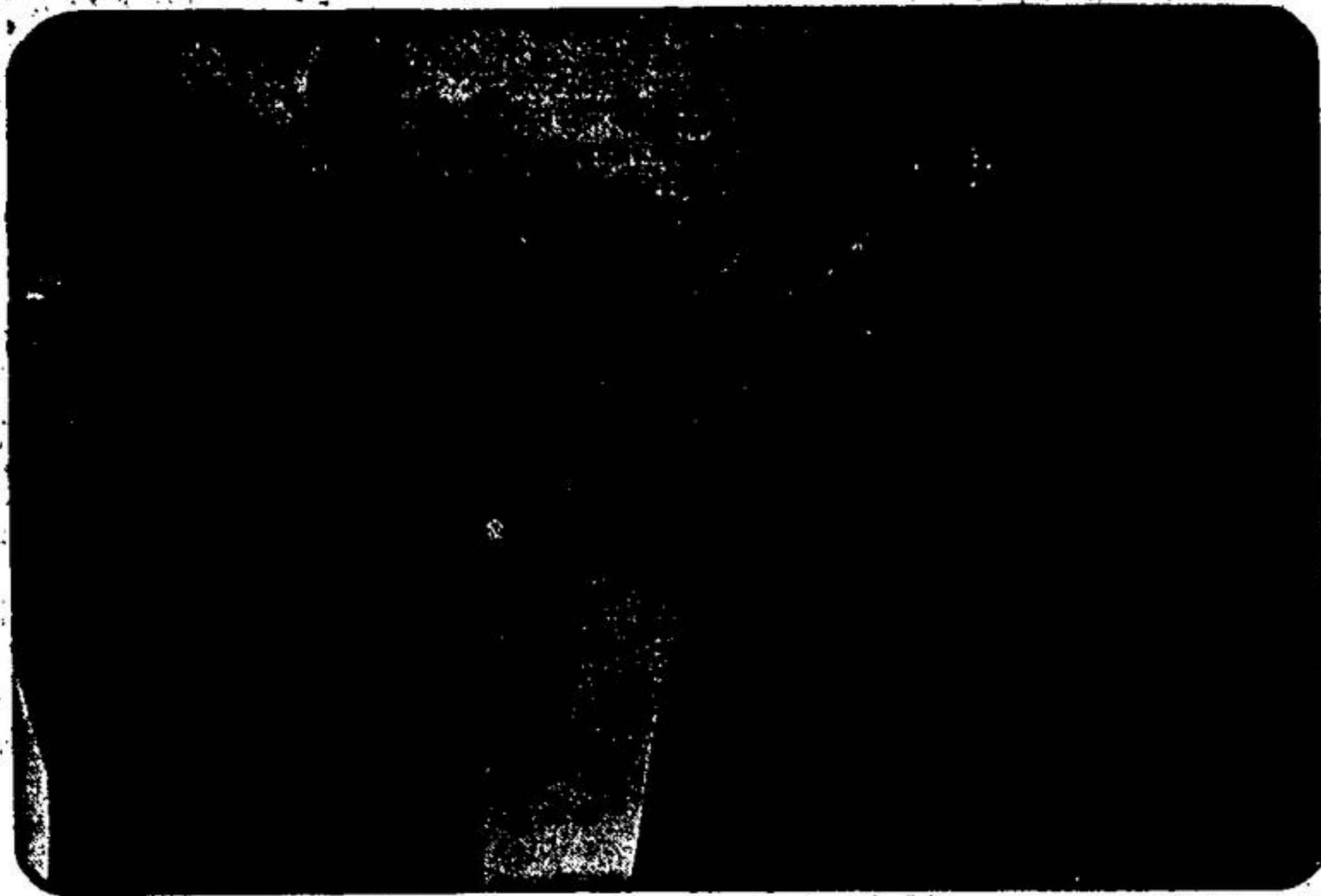


Before Leaving for Moscow

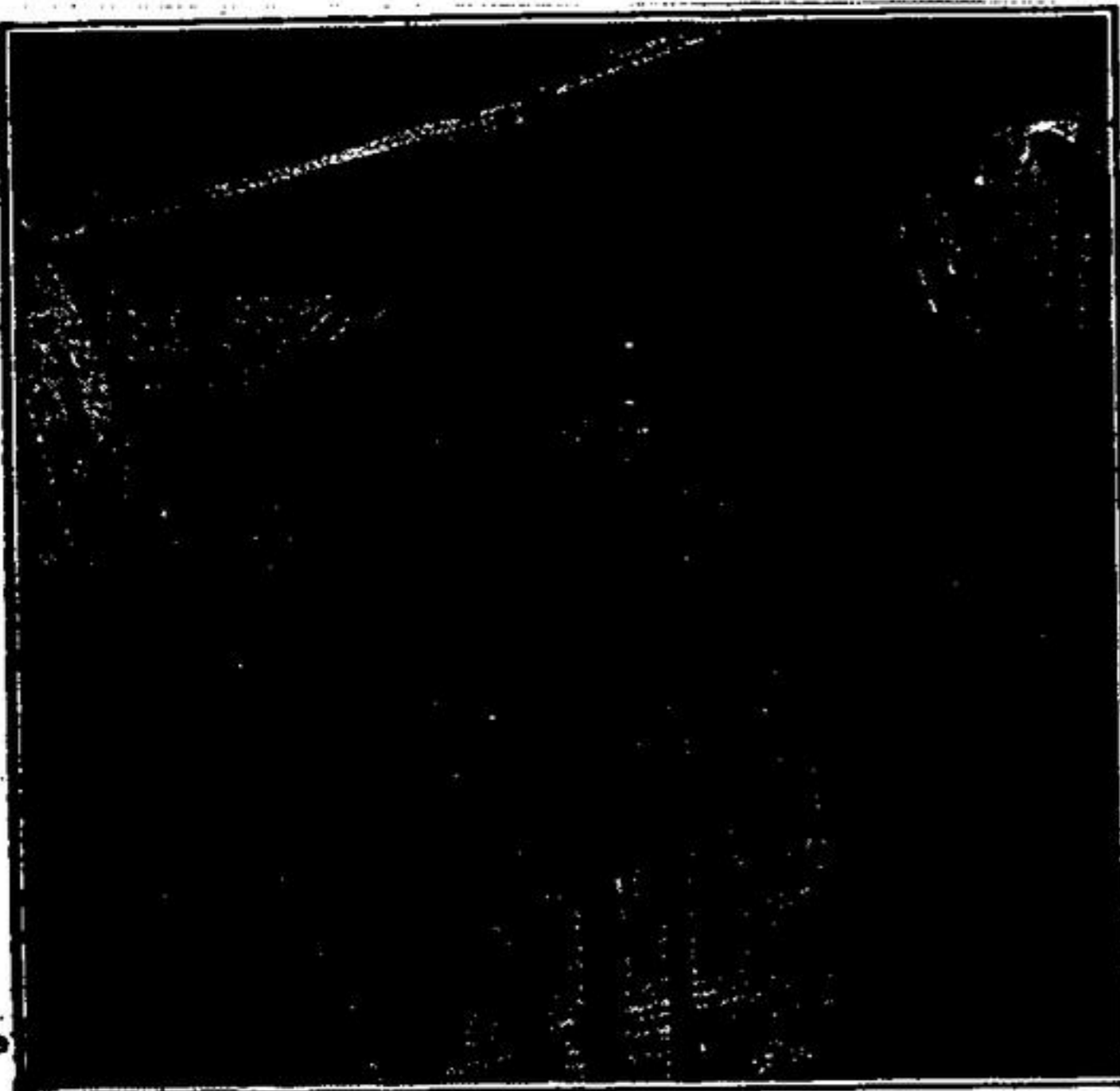

"THEY FLY FOR FREEDOM"

The British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, first announced in December, 1939, has expanded very rapidly to keep pace with the urgent demands of the war. It has for several months been turning out thousands of pilots, gunners and observers at about twice the rate originally planned and, with facilities virtually completed, the rate is now increasing.

Each Wednesday at 10.30 p.m. EDST, the CBC presents part of the story of the Air Training Plan in dramatized broadcasts written by Gerald Noxon, with actuality inserts from the training centres.

Last Wednesday, Oct. 22nd, the programme was based on the work of the Operational Squadron of the R.C.A.F., now doing war service on this side of the Atlantic. It is an outgrowth of the arduous and specialized training period undergone by thousands of young men from all over the Empire and the United States.

In the accompanying illustration a student pilot is learning the fine points from his instructor.
