"As We See It"

THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT deserves a medal for attempting to stabilize prices and wages. It looks like a man's job. In fact we doubt if it can be successfully done. The old law of supply and demand seems to be so permanently established as is that other law namely, the law of gravity. However, with plenty of co-operation it should be possible to improve conditions in regard to wages and prices to the benefit of all. Most of us have an idea that if we can buy an article at a low price and sell it at a high price that the completed action would spell prosperity, but we forget that we aren't all able to do that all the time. The person that had to accept the low price for the article that we bought isn't going to have as much cash as he should have had to buy with and the same applies to the person that we sold the article to, at the high price. With their purchasing power limited somebody isn't going to be able to do as much business as he would have, had each of these persons been able to deal at a fair price. Taking advantage of conditions to make an extra profit may look good at the time but in the long run a fair price for everybody would really spell prosperity.

YOU MAY RECALL THAT THE price of hogs dropped to a low of around 3c per pound some years ago. A marketable hog weighs around 200 pounds and at that price the seller would realize \$6.00 for his hog. During its lifetime a hog eats around \$10.00 worth of feed so that it would be difficult to show a profit on hogs during those low prices. In conversation with a man that was in the hog business at that time we remarked to him that the price was unfairly low and he went on to tell us that hogs could not be raised at a profit under those conditions and of course he was right. Shortly afterwards the price of hogs advanced and next time we were talking to this man we mentioned that hogs were on the up-grade. At this time they were just over 5c per pound, and he told us then that if they just kept at this new price that it wouldn't be too bad. He had forgotten that hogs were still eating their heads off, as it were, however, because they had been down to 3c and were now up to 5c he was optimistic. Perhaps that is why hard times are sent along once in awhile. We then appreciate it when conditions improve.

THE NEW LAW is using the average price of goods and wages as we've been paid from Sept. 15th to that of Oct. 11th as a basis for this price control. Almost all dealers are to be licensed and will of course be given a certain number and they will have to quote this number when ordering goods and it will not be possible to purchase without a license. We recall that we had to have a license during the last war but whether all dealers had to have one or not, of this we are not certain. We were dealing in food stuffs. Although we had that license we never did know what benefit it was if any to anybody. This time the license is free and we are of the opinion that in the last war we had to have that license number printed on all billheads, counter checks, etc. The idea was no doubt that if one thought that they had been unfairly dealt with the offender could be reported using his license number. One thing sure the new price control attempt will mean a few more thousand on the civil service list and for a population of 12 million we would think that we have about enough on the civil service list without adding to that number.
