#### AND STILL ANOTHER

The Ballinafad community has taken up the idea promulgated by the Up-To-You Committee, and are planning a big auction sale on Remembrance Day, November 11th. Frank Petch, Roy Hindley and W. F. Gray, three well-known district auctioneers, will be on · hand to keep things moving, with Hume Currie and W. F. McEnery as clerks. The committee in charge is headed by D. J. Sinclair, chairman, Mrs. Dick Shortill, secretary, and W. Wright, treasurer.

The sale will get under way at 7 p.m. standard time, and there will be a refreshment booth, as well as three lucky draws on Christmas cakes. Proceeds will be divided equally between the Red Cross and the British War Victims' Fund.

It is hoped that a large number of townspeople will be able to attend this sale, which our rural neighbours are sponsoring. As one of the committee put it, while talking to us the other day: "We're trying to bring buyer and producer together." The country people have been most generous in donating their goodschickens, vegetables and fruits, livestock, home-made baking, etc.—and it is up to the urban folk to come out and put in their bids to make the sale a success. Let's join with the people in Acton and Erin, and show Ballinafad that we appreciate their efforts.

# HALF A CARRIER

48% of the objective for Georgetown and district has been reached this week in the War Weapons drive. With two weeks still to go, every indication is that the campaign will go well over the top, and that this district will be sending at least one Universal Carrier each month to the nation's fighting forces.

It must be emphasized that the War Weapons Drive is a continuous one-not like the Victory Loan, which had the object of raising a specific amount of money in a given time. The purchase of war savings certificates and stamps must go on and on, so that every month large sums of money will be put at the disposal of the Government to supply the tools of war to our army, navy and air force.

The Georgetown Lions Club are to be complimented on their support of the campaign, whereby they will place the last stamp on a certificate for each public school pupil in the district. The money realized from the Salvage for Victory Campaign will be used for this purpose.

# STILL COLLECTING SALVAGE


