

## Juvenile Hockey Team If Players are Available

**LIONS CLUB WILL AGAIN SPONSOR TEAM, IF ENOUGH PLAYERS ARE INTERESTED**

The Georgetown Lions Club is prepared to sponsor a juvenile team again this year if enough young players in this district are interested this year. Such was the opinion expressed by the members at their regular dinner meeting on Monday evening at the McGibbon House. The entry should be made by Saturday, November 20th, when the Ontario Minor Hockey Association holds their annual meeting in Toronto, and members of the club are scouting around in the meantime to see if there are enough young players interested to assure that a team can be got together.

### Christmas Tree

Tickets are now being sold by the club for the annual lucky draw on turkeys, geese, and chickens. Proceeds from this will be used, as in the past, for the Christmas tree at Main and Mill Street corner, and it won't be long until the huge tree makes its appearance in the usual spot. Saturday, December 20th, is the big day when Santa Claus comes to town, and every kiddie gets a present at the tree.

### War Savings Plan

A good reception has been accorded the club's offer to insert the last stamp in a book of War Savings Stamps completed by every child in this district. Georgetown Public School pupils have already started on this, and over two hundred children have begun to fill in their booklets. The children will be allowed twenty weeks from the start of the plan to complete their book. Lion Arthur Beaumont, who is chairman of the district War Savings Committee, has been instructed to advise rural schools in the district of the offer of the Club.

### Financial Set-Up

It was brought to the attention of the members that there were some residents who did not understand the financial set-up of the Lions Club. All money collected from the public in any way—from draws and raffles, entertainment, etc. is placed in a trust fund, which can only be used for public expenses.

This is entirely separate from the Club's general account, in which is placed money received from initiation and membership dues, and which is used to meet expenses not connected with welfare work—bringing speakers to meetings, etc.

Thus, all money collected from the public is used for the purpose for which it is specified, and is never mixed with the general club funds.

### Entertainment

It was suggested that instead of bringing in outside speakers, members of the club be asked to make speeches about their varying lines of business. Each member has something interesting to tell others about his own particular profession, and this would be both entertaining and educational to the other members. This was left in the hands of the Program Committee, which consists of Lions A. C. Welk, W. H. Long and Le Roy Dale.
