

Outstanding Entry at Annual Halton Plowing Match

Unfavourable weather conditions failed to dampen the ardour of the plowboys at the Annual Halton Plowing Match held on the farm of Albert Anderson, Nassagaweya Township on Friday of last week. Fifty-one contestants were in action and according to judges N. G. McLeod, William Hostrower and Clark Young, the work was equal to the best seen at the recent International at Peterborough. One of the highlights was the work of Miss Margaret Erb of Gads Hill, the only lady contestant who plowed the second prize ridge in the Second Class Jointer Walking Plows.

The Bank of Commerce Trophy for the outstanding ridge by a walking plow in the match was won by R. G. Brown, veteran champion plowman of Galt. John Lister of Hornby also achieved distinction by being awarded the special cash prize of \$10.00 offered by the Salada Tea Company for the best ridge plowed by a Halton contestant. In much as Mr. Lister was a gold medal winner in the Salada Tea Class in 1940, he is not eligible to represent Halton in the big 1942 event. Kenneth Peattie of Milton and Ivan Taylor, Moffat, were declared eligible to compete in the Salada Tea Class next year for which it is expected gold and silver medals and a free trip will be offered to the two best plowmen.

Eight Halton young men under 20 years of age competed for the Bank of Nova Scotia Trophy with the award going to Donald Ferguson of Rockwood. This young man together with his brother Harold comprised the winning Township Team from Nassagaweya and were awarded the Fisher Orchards Special. Donald Ferguson also won the Kenneth MacMillan International 407 Walking Plow and his brother the Halton Open and Butter Company silver try.

In the tractor class open to Halton County the first prize offered by P. D. Salter of Hornby, was won by Billy James, of Georgetown, who incidentally had the distinction of being the youngest plowman in the field. In the same class the Stirling and Dynes special for the best ridge plowed by Ford-Ferguson equipment was awarded to Henry Pell of Milton.

The ladies of the Hornby Women's Institute catered for the banquet in their usual efficient manner.
