Georgetown Wins 5-3 in Hard Fought Tussle at Elmira

Overtime Needed to Break 2-2 Tie—Delast Dealt Short Foul—Drook's Wrecked Back to Georgetown Line-up

Minus the services of Lindsay, De Mille and Welch—the latter on the injured list after a severe shaking up in the Friday game earlier in the week—Georgetown intermediates journeyed to Elmira last Thursday night to meet the highly-touted Blue and Gold from that town. Making his first appearance since the 1938-39 season was Frank Lethbridge, sturdy Gino Williams defenceman, and the steady game he played showed that he had forgotten any of the tricks of the Dore-Hurst-Hall combination that used to delight the spectators. Another newcomer was a Georgetown uniformed Delast, a five foot eight ball of dynamite, who had noted the tyke goal which sent the game into an extra period and added another point in the overtime period for good measure.

The game was even, and referee Jim House had little trouble keeping the shots and keeping the teams on the straight and narrow. The Elmira took up, which being more and more to look like a bunch of the boys from Kitchener in sheep clothing, tested some additions which included Bill Peacock, Schacht and P. Webster. For starting bounces on the home team, we would pick Nelson, platinum-clad product of last year's Juniors, who knew a lot about hockey, while John Bindernagel showed that he was no slouch as nettender for Elmira.

Georgetown was bothered in the first period with an every man for himself attitude that didn't produce much in the way of scoring points, and it was not until the overtime frame that they really teamed up and showed the Elmira how to do it even the great Bindernagel can't do when he faces a smooth-shooting opposition.

Elmira Took the Lead
Bindernagel tied the game up early in the second with a hard, tricky shot which House had no chance to save. Soon after, Richardson scored for Georgetown, but it was disallowed, with the Elmira goal-judge claiming it came after the referee's whistle had blown. Plomski was penalized, and Ward received a penalty for unintentional high-sticking. Just after returning to the ice, "Bungy" was sent to the cooler for another two-minute spell, which didn't look merited. Plomski's goal near the end of the period put Elmira in the lead 2-1.

Elmira Tied It Up
Bindernagel still pressing hard in the third period, and it looked as if they were going to come out on top for awhile, until Delast pulled the game out of the fire and tied things up at the half-way mark. From then on, Georgetown really got down to business and began to show the brand of hockey that swamped Ferguson Thistles earlier in the week. Even with a man short when McMullin was penalized, they looked inspired, and Bindernagel had his hands full with a volley of shots from the Papermakers' talented sticks. The period ended with a 2-all tie, and according to regulations the game went into ten minutes of overtime with no rest period.

Some Good Hockey
It was this last ten minutes that gave rooters on both sides something to cheer about. Mooney scored for Georgetown on a pass from Kempshead, and seconds later he and Krueger tangled for a double penalty. While the pair were off the ice, Morrison tied it up again, but Elmira was short on man-power when Florne Muller joined Mooney and Krueger in the penalty box. Georgetown was quick to take advantage of this, and Delast scored his second goal of the evening. McMullin tricked Bindernagel, on a solo effort, with 45 seconds to go, which clinched the game, and sent Georgetown home victors with a 5-3 score.
