Erneat Weir McCulloch, former mayor of Brampton, died following a heart H. B. Browne to Milton High School attack at his home last Priday. A lifelong Brampton resident, he was an associate of the W. B. McCulloch Mothers' Allowance Board; Ex-warden Planing Mill. He first became a member of the Brampton Council in 1930. and the following year was acclaimed Deputy-Reeve. In 1902, he was elected Reeve and held the office for three years, serving as Warden of Peel County in 1933. He was elected Mayor in 1935, and served two terms.
