The following article by J. V. McArve seems a fitting close for this report:

There is an old Eastern saying—or it might have been Persian—that if you have only two pennies in the world you should spend one on bread and buy a lily with the other. It occurs to us when we think of the proposal that for the duration of the war flowers should not bloom in the city parks, but that their place should be taken by grass. We have over the fact that in some circumstances grass is just as expensive to grow as flowers, and that it is easier to maintain a fine garden than a fine lawn, and imply condemn the idea as one born of a kind of patriotic hysteria.

In fact a more masterly misconception of what flowers mean, we have never come across. Flowers mean beauty. They speak to the spirit of man, sometimes in a way nothing else can, and rarely now if ever is the time when man's spirit should be exalted. The sight of flowers can make it give off some of their own perfume. To meditate upon them is to help the average man better himself and his relation to his brother man, and even to make some feel within them the stirrings of something which they may call Divinity.

Flowers are one of the most beautiful things man has developed from something which at the beginning has little use or beauty. To ask us to do without them while the war rages is to ask us to tear out of our minds all thoughts of lovely things, and to live in a kind of austere rage while the fighting lasts. We are sure that

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on reflection the alderman who made this suggestion will realize that it is akin to forbidding music for the duration. Let us see the flowers. Perhaps they may whisper to us some of the things we are fighting for.
