Somewhere in the wide theatre of war the life of one of the men of the armed forces or of a bombed victim may be saved by a transfusion of Royal blood as the result of a voluntary blood donation given by Princess Juliana of the Netherlands. It was her third donation.

## Georgetown Trim Elmira In

### First Play-off Game 5 - 1

#### Game Late in Starting—Second Game to be Played in Elmira Thursday (To-morrow) Night.

After a two-week lay-off the Georgetown Intermediates trounced the Elmira Silverheads 5 - 1 in the first game of a home-and-home play-off series, at the arena here on Tuesday night. The long rest seemed to give Thompson's men the urge to get going, and after 60 minutes of hard-hitting remained victorious over their highly-rated rivals.

Although there was some doubt as to whether the game would be played due to ice conditions, there was a good crowd on hand, and the ice could have been in a worse condition. The affair was late in starting when the referee buried himself to find out how many games should be played in the series and after he had struggled to do so in such a way as to leave both clubs in the dark, the game proceeded at about 9:30.

The first period opened with both clubs trying to get the drop on the other, but neither were effective, and as a result they literally burned up the ice in the first few minutes. However, Trotter showed Georgetown to superiority when he netted a goal on Lindsay's and McMullin's pass. Two minutes later Kornblum made it 2 - 0 when he took Bowman's pass and shot point blank at the Elmira goal. Three penalties resulted in the frame and three for holding — Miller, Lindsay, and Richardson.

Play evened up in the second frame as the two clubs got things up and down did everything but tie up the score. Gable Boase redeemed himself in this period, after the last game with Elmira and getting into his usual good style, turned away many pucks labelled for the net. He did manage to score once on a pass from Miller and Behnert halfway through the game. Bowman received the only penalty.

The Papermakers were not through, and before the next twenty minutes were over had counted three goals and ended the game with a 5 - 1 score. Kornblum, Trotter and Lindsay were the scorers. Kornblum's goal came while Lindsay and Miller played the penalty. Trotter and McMullin combined for the second and 10th goal off the team short-handed. Mooney scored at the halfway mark.

It always fails to win the first game of the play-off series and Georgetown fulfilled their endeavor. The second game will be played on Elmira tomorrow (Thursday night) when a expected large crowd of supporters will follow the team.
