**Drop Second 2-0 on Elmira Ice—Wis 6-3 at Galt Last Night—Special Train Takes Georgetown Fans to Game**

Georgetown Intermediates are leading two to one in games in a three-out-of-five play-off series with Elmira for the Intermediate "B" Group 2 honors. What may be the deciding game will be played in Galt to-morrow (Thursday) night, when Elmira plays their second home game in that city, and a win for Georgetown means the end of the series and a chance at some outside competition. The first game in Georgetown was won by the locals 5-1, while a second game in Elmira last Thursday, played on a soupy ice surface, saw the Silverwoods blank Georgetown 2-0. With uncertain weather conditions, Georgetown took no chances of another postponement, and arranged to play their second home game on the artificial ice of the Galt rink last night. A special train was arranged, and fans from Georgetown, Brampton and Acton made the trip to cheer on a smooth-clicking team which held the edge all the way and just couldn't make any mistakes.

Georgetown pressed hard all through the first period, and Trotter and Mooney started things off with a goal at the four-minute mark. Davidson drew a penalty for boarding Nelson, and Ward got his first goal of the season (and a nice one, it was) on Davidson's pass. Seconds before the whistle blew, another "first goal of the season" was scored from Dewhurst's stick, on a pass from McMullin.

McMullin and Trotter teamed for a fourth Georgetown counter early in the second frame, followed by another by Trotter and Mooney to give Georgetown a comfortable five-goal lead. An Elmira goal by Schacht and Miller was nullified by another Mooney-Trotter effort, while Schacht was cooling his heels in the penalty box.

The game was more even in the third period, and neither side seemed able to find a weak spot in the opposing defence. A belated last-minute rally netted two goals for Elmira, but there was no chance of them catching the wing-footed Georgetonites, and the final whistle saw Elmira at the short end of a 6-3 count.

Anything can happen in to-morrow night's game, but if Georgetown shows half the class they did last night, we predict a win and a group title. It's been a great series so far between two fast, clean-playing teams, and we've witnessed some real hockey.

**The SNAPSHOT GUILD**  
PICTURING SMALL CHILDREN



Good expression is the important point in baby shots. Watch for them—and let your subject be his natural self.

IT'S easy enough to get good baby pictures—if you go at it the right way. The secret of the whole matter is to pick your subject when he's in a good mood—and just let him be natural. Give him a toy—something bright, something that's colorful and maybe new to him, and he'll provide the expressions you want.

This is one case where you don't need to worry about small details of the pose, or about special lighting effects. Good expression—a genuine, natural effect—is more important. And the best lighting is simple—a soft, overall light, with plenty of illumination in the shadows.

Indoors, you get this type of lighting by proper placing of your photo lights. Space them rather well apart—one toward the subject's left, one over toward the right. If you have a third light, it may often be used to brighten up the background, producing the light, cheerful effect that is so desirable in a baby picture. The third light, if used only for the background, will make no practical difference in the exposure.

Very satisfactory snapshots of babies and small children can be made with a box camera or a simple folding model. However, if I were choosing a camera especially for these pictures, I would want a shutter with speeds up to at least 1/100 second, so that when the subject was lively and active I could still get good sharp snapshots. And I would want an eye-level view finder—I find it the most convenient type for these shots.

But whatever camera you use, remember the points above—balance your lighting for soft shadows, let the child be natural, and watch for good expressions. Do that, and you'll get satisfying pictures.
