THIS AND THAT IN SPORT

IT IS doubtful whether anybody missed this column last week, but with Tuesday night being hockey night and special trains, it gave us little time to dash off some up-to-the-minute news for Wednesday's paper. However, we took the jump on this week's "blab" and started early in the week to round out the column.

THE NEWS that Joe Scherzl has been connected with a hockey deal with the Boston Bruins N.I.L. team, seems to have overshadowed much on the local sport front, coming as it has so close on the heels of Bob Goodham's entry with the Toronto Maple Leafs. While Joe now resides on a farm in the Merivale district he has always been connected with hockey in this country until this year when he has been setting the pace for the Milton Junior C team. Joe Scherzl was born in Hungary, but came to this country at an early age. The first I remember of Joe was when the Madnet Hockey League played back in 1927-28. Joe was a big lad for his age even at that time, and packed a shot that some of the intermediates envied. His skating ability was another big asset, and as young Joe literally burned up the ice and drove a pack toward the opposing goal many a net-minder was seen to shudder. Since those eventful days of madnet hockey, I said they were successful for many of the boys of Georgetown, he has progressed along the hockey road with a fair measure of success. He lined up with Georgetown Junior a couple of years back and his prowess brought a certain amount of respect to the team. This season Georgetown failed to produce a Junior team so Joe Scherzl, along with Jimmy Cotter, Willie Murphy and Ormin Carter, cast their lot with the Milton team. So outstanding has been the hockey career of Scherzl that professional scouts have been attracted to him. Through his sports-savvy, Milton Junior C's have been able to stay in the group play-downs, when Joe paced the game out of the first with his prolific scoring. While there had been some comment in the daily press in regard to his chance to turn pro, it is not taken as a reality, until the good news broke over the weekend that "Buddy" Carter had succeeded in putting through a deal for Scherzl with the Boston Bruins. We are not familiar with the terms of the contract at the time of writing, but we will see what happens later regarding another Georgetown player in the ranks of the "pro."

WE AGREE with Harold Mooney when he says, "anything is liable to happen in a hockey game." We didn't go to the game last night for the fourth game in the Intermediates group 2 play-off between Elmira and the home team. We can't seem to take so many nights in a row anymore, and think it would be a "sensible thing" for Georgetown to walk off with the group championship, we gave the better half a chance to go to the game, but we were benighted our absence from such an important hockey fixture. We believe we could count on our fingers all the home games of Georgetown's hockey teams that we have missed in the past ten years, and have seen a good many of the out-of-town games. And from all reports we did not miss much hockey by not going to Galt last Thursday. Seems the local team were a tired lot of boys—especially the "imports," who had played in their own balliwick, the previous Saturday and Wednesday, and for the locals on Tuesday and Thursday. This is tough going for even the best. However, there should be no excuses for Thursday's night—and we may yet see another group championship here.

WE HAVE been listening to a lot of pre-game prattle and it would seem the odds for the fifth game would rest with Georgetown. We are not to endorse those deductions, although we believe Elmira has a good team also. They have a wide-open style of playing that seems to fit in well with the home-club's tactics and this goes a long way in furnishing a game the crowd really goes for. While their puck-handling ability is not, we believe, on a par with the Papermakers, they are a hard bunch of back-checkers who keep relentlessly at it, backed up by an outstanding net-minder. But "anything is liable to happen in a hockey game," so we kept our money in our pocket—and our fingers crossed, hoping that our team will pull out on top.

IT HAS BEEN practically conceded that the winner of this series—Elmira vs. Georgetown—will meet Owen Sound in the next round of the play-downs.
