Provision has been made for the immediate visiting of any Canadian soldier, sailor or airman who may be in any hospital in the United Kingdom as soon as advice has been received from the Records Office. These understanding women bring with them a breath of home, a Canadian newspaper, Canadian cigarettes, Canadian chocolate bars or an offer to write a letter to a beloved mother in far-away Canada. One soldier chap in speaking of this wonderful service, said he had spent one of his happiest Christmases in a Canadian hospital.

Our nearest clinic: 85 Wellensley St., Toronto. A pint of your blood may save a soldier's life. At Pearl Harbour hundreds of lives were saved by transfusions. Within an hour of the first Japanese attack, a young pilot was carried into the army hospital, the inside of his right hand and forearm torn off by a bomb. By the time he reached the hospital he was a typical shock victim, drifting quietly into the coma of death. With a prompt transfusion, color came back into his face. He began to look like a living person instead of a corpse. I hardly more than ten minutes he opened his eyes and asked for a cigarette. Here is a gift which, unlike money, unlike time or even work, is a part of yourself. A gift most literally from your heart, straight to the heart of another—to a Canadian soldier, sailor or airman who may live to help save all you count precious in this world because you took one simple, generous step to save him.
