"Christian Flag" Dedicated At United Church Sunday

Rev. R. C. Todd, Address Congregation on "Making the World Safe for Democracy"

An impressive service was held in the United Church on Sunday morning, when the dedication of a Christian Flag took place. This special service was being coming as it did during "The Week of the Great Crusade," and prior to St. George's Day on Thursday of this week. The Christian Flag has held prominence in the church since the days long ago of St. George, when he and his patriotic endeavoured to drive the heathen out of the Holy Land where Jesus once lived. To-day more than ever in this generation the Christian Flag stands out as a guide in the forming of a new democracy in post-war days.

The Christian Flag is a blue square in the upper corner with a red cross, and a white cross in the center. The flag was donated to the church by Mrs. W. O. Anthony, and the standard by the Women's Association of the church. During the singing of the hymn "Path of our Fathers," the Christian Flag was brought to the front of the church by Robert Burns, and dedicated "to the glory of God and his church," by the minister, Rev. R. C. Todd. While the congregation sang the old hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers" the flag was placed in the position it will remain in the church. In connection with the service a large floral cross was placed at the front of the church by Mr. Hedley Shaw.

Choosing as his text for his sermon, "Making the World Safe for Democracy," the minister gave a very stirring address, pointing out the pitfall into which the world should not be allowed to fall in post-war days. He said that democracy was not enough in itself for the people of the world, unless religion and religious principles were given the uppermost place in our lives, and in the lives of the leaders of governments.
