

### Letter To Citizens From President Local Red Cross

Next Monday is the commencement of the Canadian Red Cross campaign for funds to carry on the work of the Red Cross for the coming year. The last campaign was held in September, 1940. No campaign was held last year. The campaign last year was for funds for the War Services Fund, and it had been arranged that the six war services and the Red Cross would hold a joint campaign to raise funds this May.

It was the opinion of the Georgetown Branch that with the funds raised to be divided amongst 7 organizations that we would not receive sufficient funds to carry on and also under existing regulations no provision had been made for membership.

On account of these facts the Georgetown District held a membership drive and realized a membership of about 700. Each person canvassed was just asked to pay \$1.00 for membership, although several people gave more than the \$1.00 no doubt feeling it was going to a good cause.

Before the membership drive was completed the government announced a change of policy, which was to the effect that hereafter the war services organizations would be financed by the government, and the Red Cross would make an appeal for funds this May alone. In all the other nations the Red Cross is maintained by public subscriptions, so it was felt that it should be supported in the same way in Canada. I am informed by those in authority that the only national annual appeal for funds will now be made by the Red Cross Society.

When the drive was made by the Red Cross for members it was of course understood that the War Services and Red Cross would make their annual appeal in May. The only change is that the appeal will now be made on behalf of the Red Cross instead of the Red Cross and the War Services.

The last appeal of the Red Cross in 1940 was for \$6,000,000. The appeal now is for \$6,000,000 an increase of 50 per cent. This means that if we do our fair share with the rest of the Dominion, we will increase our giving 50 per cent. Georgetown's quota is \$4,000.

As the war goes on the work of the Red Cross increases. The big increase has come in connection with parcels being sent to the prisoners-of-war. The people of Britain cannot spare the food as they have hardly enough for themselves. Australia is threatened with invasion, so that the burden has fallen on Canada (we should consider it a privilege) to supply the needs of our prisoners-of-war in Europe, the Middle East and the Far East. This is going to cost \$3,500,000-4,000,000 of which has been set aside for British and Canadian prisoners at Hong Kong. About forty cents out of every dollar you contribute will be spent in food and clothing and other necessities for our pris-


oners-of-war. We who are living in safety and comfort should feel a deep responsibility to see that every comfort gets to our prisoners-of-war, and that every wounded soldier, sailor, airman, and bomb victim has the best attention possible, and this can be done by seeing that the Canadian Red Cross has the funds to carry on.

If every citizen will give according to his means there will be no doubt about the success of this campaign. The war situation has become so serious that it is the duty of all citizens to throw off the cloak of complacency and realize that we have all got to make real sacrifices if we are going to survive. Surely we will not have to have a Dunkirk in this country to make us realize our responsibilities.

I have never known Georgetown district to fail in any patriotic endeavour, and feel absolutely confident that the present Red Cross appeal will not be an exception, but will be loyally supported by every citizen, and when the campaign ends it will be found that the Georgetown district has again gone over the top with a bang, and that the Army of Mercy will be able to continue its march at a quickened pace with an ever increasing number of loyal citizens to support them.

During the afternoon the council adjourned to go and see a portion of road on Lot 28, Con. 1, which has been causing considerable trouble for the past year.

Mrs. Preston's handwork may have been left in a ship-sinking. But on the other hand, it might have been the acknowledging letter that went astray, and she is writing to make enquiries as to whether the quilt ever reached the Old Land.

At Christmas-time, Mrs. Tom McDonald, another sister in Barrie, donated a doll and cradle and tickets were sold on this and the money turned over to the War Victims' Fund. The doll, won by Mrs. Grace, was later raffled at a Lorne Scots W.A. meeting, and the cradle, won by Eric Warnes in South Porcupine, was the basis of another raffle in the northern town.

One of the latest activities of Mrs. Preston is the collection of salvage bones and fats, in which she is co-operating with the Georgetown Lions Club Salvage Campaign. Housewives take their small quantities of fat to the restaurant, where it is boiled down and put in large sealed containers. The bones are collected in a tin trunk, which she brought to Canada from England as a girl of eighteen. The first lot sold amounted to \$3.95, and that's only a start.

A salvage verse, composed by Mrs. Preston, further the campaign, was sent to Wm. Knightley, director of National Salvage, who is including it in a forthcoming news letter to service organizations collecting salvage. Mrs. Preston has also composed a poem to help promote sales of War
